COMMANDER OF

DEATH AT LEPREAU.
The death of Charles Archillis, ocred at his late residence, Lepreau.

When Captain Greenlaw reached the spot he was unable to bring his tug near the wreck, but he, with two members of the crew, launched a life boat in which they drifted down to the trawler and by this means hauled the survivors of the crew into the lifeboat and then transfered them to the tug.
