BUSINESS CONDITIONS IN

CRITIC TIME PROVINCES

(Bank of Montreal Report)
The total catch of fish during the past season was less than for the previous year, and values were much lower. Owing to depressed conditions in the usual foreign markets, the industry has been seriously affected, as pre-war prices for fish now prevail without a corresponding reduction in costs of outfit. The output of coal has been less than that of last year. Mainly owing to shortage of orders and general depression, the steel plants have been operating on a reduced scale. Labor conditions are more favorable. The cut of lumber was the smallest for some years. There has been little or no demand, and while prices have fallen, sales have been few. Large lumber stocks are on hand, and indications are that operations for the coming season will be on a very small scale. The crops suffered from drought. Hay and cereal crops were light and pasturage was poor. Potatoes, however, were in average crop. The Nova Scotia apple crop is estimated to be larger than last year and of good quality. Manufacturing has been carried on in nearly normal proportions. Wages have declined slightly. Wholesale and retail trade has suffered in common with the rest of the Dominion. While sales have fallen off, stocks on hand are being steadily liquidated. Merchants are purchasing cautiously. The numbers and volume of failures show a marked increase over recent years. Dominion government expenditures have been largely continued to the dry dock at St. John, while provincial government outlays have been limited to the improvement of highways and the development of hydro-electric power. Municipal expenditures have been largely for school improvements and other essential works. Business in the Maritime Provinces has been greatly affected by changing conditions in the lumber and fishing industries. Although these provinces are now passing through a period of read-

justment with consequent unemployment, conditions are fundamentally sound.

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CANADA'S DAIRY

PRODUCE EXPORTS

Shipments of Butter and Cheese to Europe Show Increases Over 1920.

(Montreal Gazette)
The dairy produce export trade from the port of Montreal for the season 1921 was brought to a close on Saturday, December 3, by the sailing of the S. S. Lord Antrim for Rotterdam with 800 boxes cheese. The season from 1920 to the present has been a satisfactory one, as the make of both butter and cheese was larger than that of 1920, and in consequence the quantity of goods handled was in excess of the previous season, but owing to the erratic state of the market, and especially so for cheese throughout the season of 1921, the indifferent attitude on the part

of English importers, it is a question whether it was a profitable one from a financial standpoint.

The total exports of butter to the United Kingdom and the continent for the season 1921 were 70,874 packages, but in addition to this there were 29,919 packages shipped to the United States, and 6,794 packages to Newfoundland, making a grand total of 107,587 packages. The exports to the United Kingdom and the continent show an increase of 65,017 packages as compared with the previous season, and the shipments to the United States show an increase of 19,099 packages for the same period in 1920. In addition to the above shipments, there were also a number of car lots shipped to West St. John, Winnipeg and other points in Canada.

The export trade in eggs from here for the season 1921 was somewhat disappointing, as the shipments only amounted to 214,308 cases, as against 271,773 cases for the previous season, showing a decrease of 57,465 cases, and included in the above there were 80,140 cases from the United States, making the annual exports of Canadian eggs 125,048 cases.
