Carpenter's Sparring Partners Enthusiastic

Manhasset, N. Y., June 2—Sparring partners who have entered the ring for workouts with Dempsey declared today that Dempsey's chances of winning were extremely slight. Jack Goldberg, a welterweight from Panama, declared he never seen such a powerful right hand.

Sam McVey, a negro heavyweight, bore out the statement concerning Dempsey's condition on July 29. Jack Dempsey today began to show indications of cracking under the spell of his enforced four days of idleness.

Germans Attack French Forces But Are Held In Check

More Serious Situation Develops in Upper Silesia—Presence of Polish Insurgents Complicates Matter.

Oppeln, June 2—French soldiers forming the garrison of Beuthen, a city in Southern Silesia, near the old Polish frontier, have been attacked by forces organized by the German inhabitants of the town.

The French have used tanks in charging on the Germans, and said to have gained the upperhand in the battle. There have been many German casualties, it is reported, but the French have not suffered losses.

The situation at Beuthen is complicated by the presence of Polish insurrectionary forces around the city. The Poles began a fight with Germans in the outskirts of the town on Sunday, and when the French were attacked the Poles rushed to their assistance.

German dead and wounded have been removed from the scene of the fighting. Tanks were rushed to the scene, and the Germans, who were armed with pistols, attempted to capture the machines, but were repulsed, and were driven into adjacent buildings from the windows of which a hot fire was opened.

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The British. Members of the Black Watch, constituting a part of the British forces sent into Silesia, have reached Stoborz, about six miles northwest of Gross-Strehlitz, and Polish sentries are on duty only a short distance away.

Paris, June 2—The foreign office today issued a denial of the reports from Upper Silesia that Gen. Leroind, head of the inter-Allied commission there, had been recalled.

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SENATE REPORT ON UNEMPLOYMENT

Chiefly a Summary of Evidence Heard. Express Opinion That General Want of Confidence is Base of the Trouble in Canada—Some Opinions.

Ottawa, June 2—(Canadian Press)—A general want of confidence on the part of manufacturers, producers, middlemen and consumers is at the base of the unemployment situation in Canada, in the opinion of the senate committee on employment, which reported through its chairman, Hon. J. A. Macdonald.

The evidence of F. A. Adand, deputy minister of labor, showed 500,000 men employed in April 1921 than there were in January, 1920. The worst situation in the last two years had been reached at the end of April, and conditions had improved that time.

Coal mines in British Columbia, Alberta and Nova Scotia have been on part-time work instead of closing down. Vancouver and Toronto were said to be two cities which had fared worse in regard to unemployment.

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SPEAKS OF ROADS BETWEEN HERE AND CAPITAL

E. S. Carter Reports on Journey by River Route and Broad Road.
