BALL PLAYERS INJURED WHEN CARS COLLIDE

Chatham, N. B., Sept. 6.—While bringing the Amherst ball team from Newcastle yesterday afternoon two automobiles belonging to Allan Mann crashed into one another, injuring Alexander and Wallie Watling. The two brothers were in the first car, which was moving at a fair rate when the big car with the Amherst team without any warning crashed into them, throwing the light car into the ditch. Both the Watling boys were shot out of the car. Alexander hitting against a tree. Wallie was thrown through the windshield and sustained a severe cut on the thigh. Dr. Losier attended both the injured players and put four stitches in Wallie's leg. Chatham and Amherst played a double-header here today, the locals taking the first game. In the morning game Briggs for Chatham pitched masterly ball, being exceptionally good in the pinches. Watling caught despite his injury and played his usual good game. Chatham fans had a good opportunity to see Brownell pitch for Amherst. He showed good form and splendid control but Chatham's hits came when his meant runs. The score was 4 to 2. In the afternoon game the batteries were: Amherst, Barkhouse and McDonald; Chatham, May and Currie. This game proved to be a dandy. Chatham could not connect with Barkhouse until the seventh. May pitched gilt-edged ball but it was an up-lift fight all the way. The final score was: Chatham 6, Amherst 4.

BABE'S TWO HOMERS ESTABLISH RECORD

Ruth Crashes Out Home Run in Each Game of Double-Header and Excels All Marks.

Boston, Sept. 7.—Chalk up the forty-fifth and forty-sixth for Babe Ruth and the organized baseball. The mighty Behemoth of Bangor in the double-header against the Boston Red Sox at Fenway Park here on Sunday day hammered out one four-base blow in each game, tying and then breaking the best existing home-run record in the history of major and minor league baseball. The tremendous thumps from Ruth's bat were the signals for en-thusiasm demonstrations which could only have been excelled on the Polo Grounds. Said Boston's baseball populace went wild over the prodigious clouts which brought a world's record mark which, with whatever additions may be made later, promises to with-stand assault for many years unless Babe decides to put it into the discard him-self next season. Incidentally the Yankees won the first game by 5 to 8 and lost the second by 6 to 1. Ruth's forty-fifth home run was a terrific slam into the right field bleachers which came in the third frame of the opening game. The clout brought Babe on even terms with the organized base-ball record of forty-five made by Perry Werden in 1895. Sam Jones delivered the ball which travelled majestically out of sight amid a huge throng in the bleachers. In the second game Babe made the sixth inning a record-making occasion and crashed the ball into the right field stands, setting aside the mark which has stood for twenty-five years. Joe Bush was the victim of this history-making drive. The ball, travelling low and fast, just cleared the stand fence. Ruth's record-making hits today fulfilled an ambition, which had its incep-tion last year, when the big Yankee slugger broke Williamson's big league record of twenty-seven home runs in a season, by driving out twenty-nine. For this season Ruth determined on an as-sault on the record made by Werden, who in 1895 was playing with Minn-neapolis, then a member of the Western League. Like Ruth, Werden was power-fully built, and had tremendous driving force in his broad shoulders.
