WREATHS PLACED ON THE GRAVES OF DEPARTED HEROES. Paris, Nov. 1.—Wreaths were placed on the graves of soldiers of the Allied and Associated countries by representatives of the government and of many patriotic associations today.

The Canadian colony of Paris met at the Bonard cemetery in Versailles and placed flowers on Canadian and Allied graves and at the cemeteries at St. Cloud and Leinville, the graves of Canadians and Americans were also decorated.

NOSE GRAFTED ON MAN AFTER BEING CUT OFF. London, Nov. 2.—William Robertson was recently discharged from the King Edward VII. Hospital, Windsor, with his nose, which had been cut off in an accident, successfully replaced by a surgeon.

"I was in a stable at Windsor on Aug. 15," said Robertson, "when a skylight fell and cut my nose clean off. I was taken to the King Edward VII. Hospital, where the arteries were tied up. The surgeon then asked, 'Where is the missing nose?' The son of a doctor 'cycled to the stable and made a search, finding my nose amongst the straw. It was brought back to the hospital, and an operation performed to replace it. My nose was off for three-quarters of an hour to an hour."

ASKED HOW HE FELT, Robertson replied, smilingly, "Everything is going on satisfactorily, and my nose is on all right, as you can see."

FIRST FLYLESS TOWN. Saranac Lakes N. B., Nov. 3.—The health authorities here claim that the town is the first to be "flyless" in the world.

Despite the unusually hot weather during the summer there were hardly any more flies than most places have in January, and the prediction is confidently made that next year there will be none at all.

It cost the town about \$1,000 to eradicate the fly nuisance, which was accomplished by requiring that manure be screened and frequently removed.

MASONS APPROVE EDUCATION IDEA

California Grand Lodge Indorses The Purpose of Smith-Towner Bill and Adopts a Strong Americanization Resolution

San Francisco, Nov. 2.—Two important resolutions dealing with public questions were passed by the annual convention of the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of the State of California, which has just closed its session here.

The resolution, after declaring that the convention believed that the bill in question "gives promise of the realization of a free and untrammeled democracy, which depends upon the enlightenment and education of the citizens of the republic and the Americanization of its aliens," continued: "Not feeling justified in formally endorsing any specific measure, the Grand Lodge endorses the spirit and purpose of the measure, and its members express the hope that the measure will receive careful consideration."

The convention also passed a strong Americanization resolution declaring that "there appears to be a world-wide and organized movement fostered by enemies of law and order to subvert and destroy government," this movement being "very manifest in the United States."

In order to carry out this work among Masons, the committee on education was enlarged and it was arranged to have speakers present the matter to the membership of the lodges. It was decided to have sufficient copies of the resolution printed to have one placed in the hands of every Mason in the state of California, and to have the secretaries of the lodges directed to deliver a copy to each member.

In St. Philip's church yesterday the services were conducted by R. H. McIntyre in the absence of the pastor, Rev. H. W. Pinkett, through illness. Gordon Stevens addressed the school in the afternoon and in a musical programme those taking part were Ethel Spencer, J. Bissard and Miss L. Williams.

Rev. D. Hutchinson, D.D., of Main street Baptist church, spoke last night on prohibition. He gave four reasons against the liquor traffic—it was the enemy of the home; the enemy of the Christian church; the enemy of all legitimate trade and commerce, and the cause of most of the vice and crime in the land. He said all engaged in this traffic should be put in jail without the option of a fine.

This school of thought, although inconsiderable, was undoubtedly affecting a great many church members. If in this day of great peril and heartrending the churches were to meet the needs of the hour, there was urgent need for a revival and extension of personal consecration. It was time for them to hear the clarion cry of John the Baptist, "Repent for the Kingdom of Heaven is at hand!"

Continuing, Dr. Wallace said it seemed at one time reasonable to expect great aid in the propaganda of the Christian faith from science, education, and riches. To some extent they had not been disappointed. In some degree science had greatly helped the defense of the Christian faith. Reverend scientists, exploring in the various fields, have gathered the results of their recent inquiry, and laid them at the feet of Jesus.

Denouncing in no uncertain terms the spread of rationalism, or "naturalism," in the country, Rev. Dr. O. C. S. Wallace, Montreal, president of the Baptist convention of Ontario and Quebec, at the opening session of the seven day conference at the First Baptist church in Ottawa, said that this was a doctrine that was totally opposed to Christianity, and one which they found increasingly difficult to fight as the years passed.

We have been told that if we would rid the Christian world of the burden of supernaturalism," he said, "that men, great men, would flock to the church; if we would erase the story of the miraculous out of the Gospel, and the history of the virgin birth, and the resurrection of Christ, and the story of His ascension that the Church would go forth and conquer. That experiment was tried over a hundred years ago in New England. There was an attempt by the aristocracy of birth and wealth in that section of the great republic to build up churches without a divine Christ, without miracles, and there never has been a more tragical failure.

Rationalism, he said, was hostile to Jesus Christ. "It has been demonstrated to be futile. Would to God that men would learn this!"

Theoretical orthodoxy the speaker also criticized. He said the influence of
