THE TURF.

New York, Dec. 11.—Sweet Briar, a brood mare, valued at \$200,000, arrived here today after a three weeks' voyage from France and the Railroad Administration made an exception to its ban on private accommodations to the home of the owner, Willis Sharpe Kilmer, at Indianapolis, N. Los Angeles, Dec. 12.—Jack Kearns, manager for Jack Dempsey, said today that he had not heard directly from Dempsey since he was said by a Paris despatch today to have issued a challenge to Dempsey for a bout for the heavyweight championship of the world.

Comiskey on the Situation.

Chicago, Dec. 12.—Whatever peace may be in the American League as the coming of the meeting in New York may be as an "armistice," said Charles A. Comiskey, owner of the Chicago Americans, today on his return to the east. Comiskey is a member of the faction opposed to President Hanson.

THE BUSINESS OF THE LEAGUE.

"We have no schedule committee nor have we issued any other business usually issued up at the December meeting," he said. "I have not changed my mind any way about the American League. Jimmy Wilde

Thinks He Won

Milwaukee, Dec. 11.—Jimmy Wilde, although accepting the verdict of the press in good spirit, has a complaint to make.

Jimmy thinks that public sentiment influenced the decision last Saturday's bout with Jack Sharkey, and he is so positive of his victory that he doubts very much whether he would even be considered by English matchmakers for a trip overseas and a bout in London.

"I understood that all the decisions have gone against me," said Wilde, "but I am positive that had the fight been fought in England I would have won easily. I did not think there was any doubt about it, even though I did not fight my usual fight. Let me ask you a few questions."

"Who landed the cleaner blows? Who did all the fouling of the hands? Who was it that did the clinching and sought the clinches?"

To the first two, to be fair, it must be stated that Wilde carried the brunt of the attack and landed by the cleaner blows. To the last there can be only one answer, Sharkey. It was who sought the clinches and clinched whenever he could to bring his weight to bear. Then Wilde continued:

"I know I was not in the best of condition for the battle. But even so, I think I won and won handsomely. Sharkey's blows were mostly on my elbows and around my head and shoulders. He crossed me in the third round, but I was never in danger and was never bothered by his blows."

SCHOOL FOR BLIND

ANNUAL MEETING

Last Year Marked by Steady

Work by Teachers and Pupils

The Progress Most Satisfactory

(Halifax Chronicle).

The annual meeting of the School for the Blind was held Tuesday afternoon.

The reports showed the school to be in a very satisfactory condition. The Board of Managers for the year were elected as follows:—J. C. Mackintosh, J. Y. Paynter, Hon. G. S. Campbell, J. Walter Allison, Charles Archibald, O. E. Smith, Hector Melton, Hon. Chief Justice Hinch, S. M. Brookfield, G. McGregor Mitchell.

Superintendent's Report.

The report of the superintendent was as follows:

The table of attendance herewith submitted shows that 153 blind persons have been under instruction during the past year, of whom eighty-seven were males and sixty-six females. Of these thirty graduated or remained at home, making the total number registered December 1, 1918, of twenty-six, six are males and fifty-seven females. Of these seventy-six are from the province of Nova Scotia, twenty-five from New Brunswick, four from Prince Edward Island, and eighteen from Newfoundland.

There has been 153 blind persons under instruction during the past year, of whom eighty-seven were males and sixty-six females. Of these thirty graduated or remained at home, making the total number registered December 1, of this year, 129.

In view of the fact that the reports of the School for the Blind for 1918 and 1919 will be printed as one, it will be unnecessary to make any lengthy report at the present time.

The past year has been marked by steady work on the part of both the teachers and pupils and progress has been most satisfactory. A number of changes have taken place in the personnel of our teaching staff to which I would call special attention.

S. R. Hussey, supervisor of the school department, who had been a member of the staff for twenty-six years, resigned.

Attendance.

The attendance of pupils at the school shows an increase over that of the previous year but it is still far below the average attendance of pupils for many years prior to the explosion as will be seen by the following table:

The falling off in attendance was due to the first inquiry to the explosion on December 6th, 1917, and since that time owing to the scarcity of labor many of the older pupils have been kept at home to do farm or household work. A reference to our register of possible pupils shows that there is no decrease in the number of pupils and if all young blind persons were attending for school our buildings would not be sufficiently large.

WHISKEY SEIZURE.

Winnipeg Police Net Big Consignment From Montreal.

Winnipeg, Dec. 13.—Police this week seized a consignment of liquor, consisting of twelve boxes containing 864 bottles, valued at more than \$8,500, at the Union station. The whiskey was shipped from Montreal as "crockery." The shipment was addressed to a local jobbing company, who deny that the liquor was owned by them.

Winnipeg, Dec. 13.—If there is anything "daring" in dresses worn by the American women today, the manufacturers of Blacksmith and Fred Younger are not to blame for it. A statement to this effect was made by David N. Mooselson, secretary of the Associated Dress Industries of America, the national chamber of commerce of the dress industry, representing more than 400 manufacturers and designers of women's dresses in the United States.

Mr. Mooselson's statement is made in certain circles as a result of a recent pastoral letter of Cardinal Amette, in which he speaks of the "immorality of certain dresses," and which has brought from Mme. Paquin, a French creator of fashions, comment to the extent that the wearer of the inmodest dress is to be condemned rather than the creator of the gown.

"So far as the manufacturers of women's dresses in America are concerned," said Mr. Mooselson, "they certainly side with Mme. Paquin and it is my privilege to go on record as saying that manufacturers and designers of women's dresses in this country are ever anxious against anything that borders on 'daring' insofar as their products are concerned."

"The dresses created and manufactured in this country are modest in style and the most daring modes are those which reach this country and represent the views of designers by the European women who demands these inmodest dresses."

"The type of American women who demands these inmodest dresses is still a minority and plays no part in the style world of the dress industry."
