Booming In England

London, June 13.—Sports of all kinds are enjoying a wonderful boom—a real come-back—throughout the British Isles this season. Many familiar faces of past fields, but the games are carried along with intense enthusiasm. The king of sport—horses—now in full swing, several of the pre-war classics having been run off, while many more are scheduled during the season. County cricket was resumed last month after a stoppage since August, 1914. With the exception of Worcestershire all the counties which competed for the championship before the war are playing two games each week which attract large crowds.

While the open championships will be omitted this year golf is steadily resuming its pre-war appearance. The Professional Golfers' Association Victory tournament, which was played two weeks ago, and attracted 108 entries, including all the leading professionals, was won by the veteran, James Braid with a score of 155. Harry Vardon was 8th (164), Edward Ray 9th (164), George Duncan 11th (165), and J. H. Taylor 19th with 166. Athletic meetings are held each week all over the country, several promising youngsters having already been unearthed.

Lawn tennis is enjoying a strong revival, many of the famous old meetings being scheduled this season, whilst, although some apparently have dropped out for the time being, they will be resumed next year.
