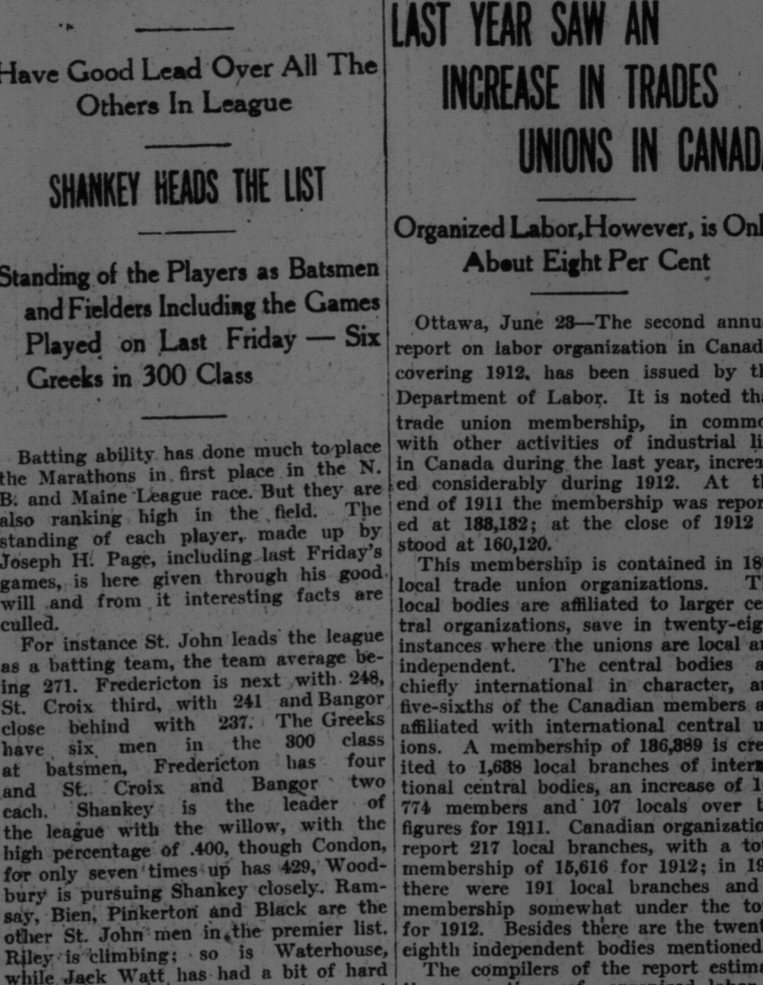

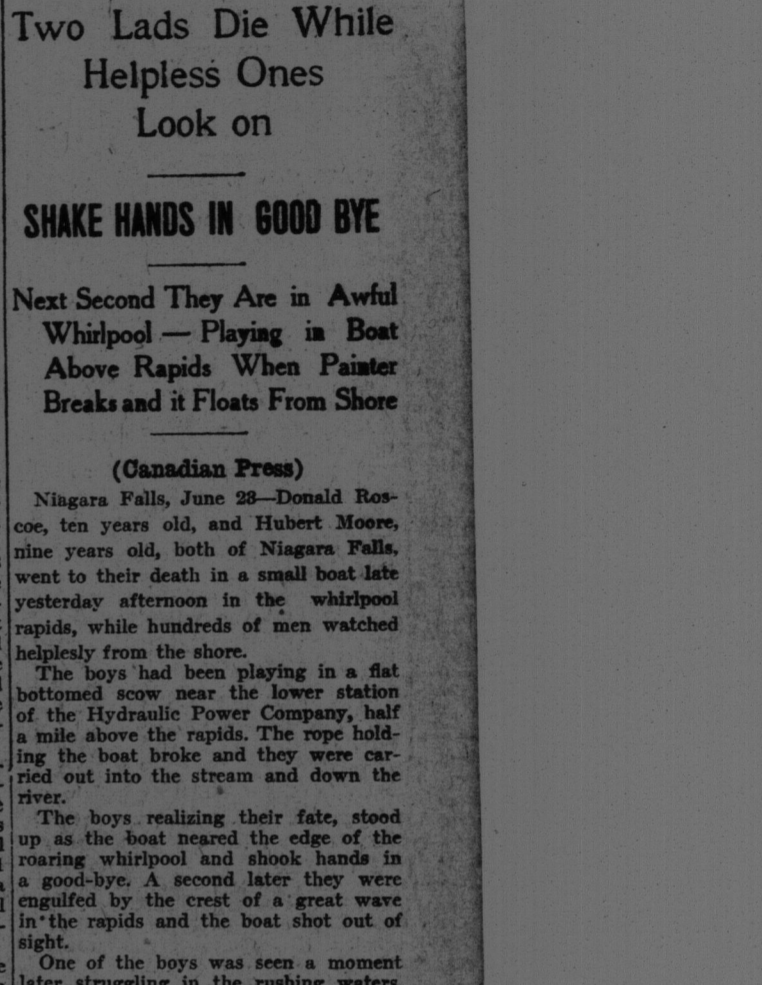

MILLION AND A HALF DAMAGE FOR REPAIRS AT PANAMA CANAL

Panama, June 22—Numerous alarming rumors of damage have gained currency as a result of a crack that recently developed in the cut-off wall of the northwest wing of the Miraflores locks of the Panama Canal.

MAY BE A FIFTH

Tons of Red-Hot Bricks, Iron Girders and Burning Timbers Fall on Firemen as They Work in Narrow Lane Near Factory

Montreal, Que., June 22—Though no definite arrangements had yet been made early today for the burial of the four firemen who were crushed to death on Sunday beneath brick walls when fire destroyed the sash and blind factory of Hevelin and Sarasin, Duvernay and Levis streets and Fabian avenue, Ste. Cenevieve ward, it was suggested by Chief Tremblay, in consultation with Mayor Lavallee and Controller Lachapelle, that if possible, a civic funeral should be held for all the bodies which were Catholics, the services should be held in Catholic and Protestant churches that are in close proximity.

FIFTH MAY DIE

There was a possibility early today that a fifth victim might be claimed. Fireman Joseph Desjardins, of Notre-Dame Hospital, of No. 22 avenue was so badly scalded by a burst of steam from a pipe in the Duvernay street factory of the building, and cut on his fall to the street, that chances for his recovery are slight.

STRIKERS READY TO GO BACK

Jaterson, N. J., June 22—More than 100 striking dyers who returned to the plants this morning, weary of the long strike of silk workers in this city, found that they could not resume work because of the lack of helpers. Most of the helpers, it is said, have left the city during the course of the protracted strike.

TRAPPED IN NARROW LANE

The victims were trapped in a narrow lane which bears the name of Fabian street and which runs in the rear of the burned factory. Between the thick brick walls of the factory and the rear a distance of not more than twenty feet, six of the firemen killed and injured, rushed with their hose, as soon as they arrived on the scene, found less than twenty minutes, four were dead, buried by the upper half of a forty-foot brick wall that had tumbled on them without warning.

GALLANT ATTEMPT AT RESCUE

Into this inferno, which he afterwards called a lane of death, rushed District Chief Arthur Mann. Devoted firefighters from the central station, who had come with him through many just such hideous traps, ran pell-mell to his assistance, without a call for volunteers being made. Together, they ripped and tore with frenzy at the pile of bricks, iron beams and burning culbers, heedless of the danger that loomed over themselves in the still swaying portion of the wall that was left standing. Heedless also of the licking flames, a sudden breeze or draft, might at any moment devour them, for they had to work within twelve feet of the burning factory. Heedless of the blistering heat that warped the steel girders of the building, the firemen worked manfully to deliver their comrades, though they had little hope of bringing them out alive.
