Montreal, Dec. 5—Practically the whole of this afternoon's session of the Enquete Court was consumed with hearing cases that have a direct bearing on the terrible conditions prevailing in Montreal with respect to young girls. Alfred Traversy and William Ledou, commercial travellers, who are alleged to have kept an establishment where young girls were lured, appeared in the Enquete Court this morning. Three young girls were called and the judge ordered that their names be kept secret. The first girl called was 19 years old. Her evidence was almost inaudible as she told her tale. She told of being in the habit of going to certain night cafes and of how she deluded her parents with a plausible story to account for her absence from home. Mr. Germain, in cross examination, endeavored to force an admission from the girl that she went to the house on Sherbrooke street willingly. The second witness, dressed in a black frock and with a picture hat, answered the questions put to her with perfect self-confidence. The third witness had gone to the house when she was 15 years of age, two years ago. At that time she had been a virtuous girl. Her visit had been repeated several times since. Another striking instance of the dangers that await young girls in Montreal was given in the recorder's court this morning when a man named Alessandro, who keeps an ice cream parlor in St. Lawrence boulevard, was sentenced to six months' imprisonment for an attack on a young girl who had entered his store to make a purchase. The girl complained to the police of the treatment she had received and Alessandro was taken into custody by Detective Colangelo.
