FRENCH READJUST RENTS.

New Law Aims to Require Those Who Can Pay to Do So.

Paris, March 6.—(Correspondence of Associated Press)—Parliament has just settled the question of war rents in France, and landlords who have had the mortgatorium hanging over their heads since the beginning of the war know at last upon what they may count. The general principle of the law just passed is that he who can pay must pay. It is a complicated measure, since the object was to satisfy at the same time, so far as possible, the landlord who wants his money and the tenant who cannot pay.

Tenants who are mobilized, or who have been out of work and whose rent is the equivalent of no more than \$100 a year in Paris and from \$50 to \$70 a year in provincial towns are released from all obligation to pay rent from the beginning of the war to the end of the first half year succeeding the signing of peace. Soldiers or workmen who have earned in the war the rent money for their families and to an extension of time for the payment of interest on mortgages.

Other clauses of the law protect soldiers and their families from expulsion and seizure and provide automatic extension of leases where the interests of the soldier tenant would be harmed otherwise.

Up-to-Date Farmers Moves Cattle in Novel Rack.

A portable floorless rack, or crate, 10 ft. wide and 30 ft. long, is the novel and very serviceable device employed on an up-to-date farm in transporting small herds of live stock on the public highway. The outfit, which is shown in the April Popular Mechanics Magazine, is about six feet high and is supported a few inches above the ground by running gear a pair of wheels being located at each end. The outfit eliminates all danger of the herd being scattered or stampeded.
