A BARREL POST OFFICE.

The "simplest post office in the world" is said to be located on the shore of the Strait of Magellan, where it collects and distributes mail for the benefit of seamen on vessels passing through the strait. No postmaster or postmistress officiates here, nor can one buy a postage stamp or ask intelligent questions about the probable length of time a letter will be delivered. In fact it is without officials, postmen, stamps, scales, postmarks, or any other visible attribute of an ordinary post office. The vessel that makes use of it knows where it is, and look for a certain high cliff from whose top a long chain hangs to the bottom, with a barrel attached. This is the post office. The vessel stops, a boat is lowered, and the post office visited. Very likely there will be a number of letters left there by other vessels passing through the strait and addressed to seamen on vessels that were sooner or later likely to pass. The latest courier looks the mail over, may or may not find a letter that has been left for collection, and "posts" in the barrel any letters that may have been written aboard that particular ship for seamen whose ships are expected to pass that way and stop to see if any mail has been left for them. It seems an odd and casual way to send and receive letters, but the sailing routes of ships that pass through the strait are definitely prescribed, and the "simplest post office in the world" fulfills a useful purpose where any other kind is out of the question.

MARSHALL FIELD'S
WILL MEANT HIS
HEIRS TO WORK

Attorney for the Estate Explains the Provision Tying Up His Fortune Until Heirs Reach 50.

Chicago, May 25.—Marshall Field's purpose in tying up his immense fortune until his grandsons reach the age of 50 was to protect his descendants from "leading useless lives of luxury and idleness," according to Attorney John P. Wilson, representing the Field estate Trustees in the action brought by Captain Marshall Field, III, to obtain possession of the residuary estate at this time.

Attorneys representing Captain Field have attacked the will of the merchant prince as contrary to public policy, because it accumulated a huge fortune, and have cited the examples of Andrew Carnegie and other rich men who have distributed a large part of their wealth. Marshall Field's motive, Mr. Wilson said, was to give his grandsons, Captain Field and the late Henry Field, the "opportunity of becoming men among men despite the handicap of a great wealth."

Under the will Captain Field will receive \$500,000 at the age of 30, \$1,200,000 at 35, \$1,800,000 at 40, and at 45 the accumulated interest, amounting to \$800,000. During the next five years the estate will pay him an income of \$3,000,000 annually, and on his fiftieth birthday he will receive the entire property. Other relatives who are joining Captain

WEEK-END
FATALITIES

Two Killed in Moncton —
Madawaska County Village
Wiped Out.

Martin O'Brien, C. N. R. section foreman at Memramcook, was struck by the east-bound Ocean Limited yesterday and killed. He was put on board the train and taken to the hospital in Amherst, but a bone had punctured his lung and he died soon afterwards. The village of Theriault, Madawaska county, was wiped out by a fire recently which started by a bush fire Thursday. Twelve buildings were also destroyed in Plaster Rock from the same cause. Guy Welch of Glassville lost his barn and several horses by fire. Frank Goodall, aged sixty-three, an employee of the C. N. R., while riding a bicycle home from work in Moncton on Saturday was struck by an automobile driven by George Harrop, and died at the City Hospital last night. While removing a large rock from in front of his residence in Brooklyn, N. S., yesterday, Harold Normandy, aged twenty-nine, was instantly killed.

HEARS THAT THE
JAP EMPEROR
HAS COLLAPSED
Honolulu, May 25.—Emperor Yoshihito of Japan suffered a physical and mental collapse about April 1, according to the Honolulu Pacific Commercial Advertiser, quoting a source unofficial but considered authentic. The adviser said the emperor was suffering from locomotor ataxia or a similar disease. Plans for establishing a regency have been discarded, the Advertiser's informant said, because it would reveal the real condition of his health.
