New York, Nov. 3.—With election day at hand, with fair weather and a heavy vote indicated throughout the United States, the rival managers of the Republican and Democratic national campaign closed their desks at headquarters last night, declared respectively that Taft and Bryan would win, and then hurried away on late trains to cast their ballots, Mr. Hitchcock at West Newton, Mass., and Mr Mack at Buffalo. Both will return there to receive the returns.
