Thursday next has been set apart as a day of general thanksgiving throughout the Dominion.

Toronto City Council has adopted a resolution favoring the granting of the franchise to women.

Mr. Hewitt, grocer, has resumed business in his old stand, north of the river.

The first snow fall of the season last night—a mixture of rain and snow which quickly turned to water.

The remains of R. W. Gilmore, the cripple who kept a fancy goods store here, were followed to the grave on Sunday last by the Knights of Labor, forming a large body, headed by the band.

The Hog Trade—The local packing houses are in full blast killing and packing hogs. This industry has assumed large proportions in Ingersoll, this town ranking third in the province in the number of hogs packed. Ingersoll takes the lead for cheese and pork.

Ingersoll Caledonian Society—The Caledonian Society held their annual meeting last night, in Nornworthy's block, when the following officers were elected: Wm. Ewart, chairman; David White, 1st chief; Joseph Gibson, 2nd chief; Robt. Vance, 3rd chief; Wm. Sutherland, financial secretary; J. S. Smith, treasurer; Rev. P. R. Ross, chaplain; Angus McLeod, standard bearer; board of directors, Jas. Brady, A. Matheson, Dr. McKay, Angus McLeod, Jas. McIntyre, Wm. McBain, Wm. Tennant, and A. W. Murdoch. Among varied business it was decided to have a supper on St. Andrew's night. At the close of the meeting the members adjourned to the oyster parlor of R. Vance, where a pleasant social time was spent.

MYSTERIOUS ACCIDENT.

Men Sitting on a Log Were Suddenly Overwhelmed.

Smith's Falls, Nov. 2.—Cecil Gallipeau of this place died at the hospital Saturday, the result of a mysterious accident which he met with on Thursday.

With his brother Elisha he was engaged in cutting wood on Jas. Mathland's farm. They had partaken of their dinner in the woods and had sat down on a log to light their pipes. A few moments later both were unconscious. About 3 o'clock Elisha recovered and saw his brother sitting on a log some distance away, but neither could tell what had happened. They called for help and short time later were brought to town. They became delirious and from that condition Cecil never rallied. His brother is almost recovered now, but is suffering from several bruises on his body. It is supposed that a heavy branch was blown from the tree near where the men were sitting and struck them both at once, the injury inflicted on Cecil Gallipeau proving fatal.

Shoots Wife, Then Himself.

Buffalo, Nov. 2.—Elbridge Vanderveer, aged 27 years, employed by the Grand Trunk Railroad as a track-walker at Port Colborne, Ont., shot his wife, Frances, aged 23 years, Saturday morning, one bullet entering her breast and another her arm. Vanderveer then shot and killed himself instantly.

The couple had been married about three years, but about a month ago they separated, the wife coming to this city, where she was keeping house at 348 Elliott street. About 9:30 a.m. Saturday Vanderveer rang the bell at her address, and when she appeared at the door opened fire upon her. Believing he had killed her, he entered the parlor and shot himself through the head.

The woman is at the hospital, but is not thought to be fatally injured.

Three Burned to Death.

Washington, Nov. 2.—Three negro children were burned to death and two other persons, after being almost suffocated, were rescued and carried down a ladder from the third floor in a fire Saturday at 308 Northwest T. street. The victims were trapped in a room on the upper floor, overcome by smoke, and died a few minutes after being removed to a hospital. The house was occupied by negro messengers and their families.

NO CHANGE IN THE MAJORITY

Official Count Leaves Malcolm S. Schell's Majority at 93.

The official count made by Alex. Rose, Returning Officer for South Oxford, on Saturday, did not change the majority of 93 for Malcolm S. Schell, as announced last Tuesday. The count, however, made some minor changes in the figures which increases the total vote of both candidates. Mr. Schell's total vote was 2,712, being 41 more than Mr. Mayberry polled in June. Mr. Sutherland's total vote was 2,619, just eight less than he polled in the Provincial contest.

Paris, Oct. 31.—A despatch from Smyrna says that the young Turks, believing that the Sultan has a secret agreement with Tewfik Pasha, the Foreign Minister, have decided to dethrone him, and replace him by his third son.

Gold In the Congo.

Brussels, Oct. 31.—Reports received from R. D. Mehun, leader of the American expedition in the Congo, state that he has discovered rich deposits of gold, tin and copper in the Manyema district.

U.S. CAMPAIGN ENDS

Candidates Wind Up Fight and Balloting Is On.

RETURNS WILL BE EARLY

Heavy Vote Will Be Polled Through-out the States—Bryan Gives His Last Message at Marysville, Kansas, and Taft at Youngstown, Ohio—"Beaten to a Frazzle," Says President Roosevelt.

New York, Nov. 3.—With election day at hand, with fair weather and a heavy vote indicated throughout the United States, the rival managers of the Republican and Democratic national campaign closed their desks at headquarters last night, declared respectively that Taft and Bryan would win, and then hurried away on late trains to cast their ballots. Mr. Hitchcock at West Newton, Mass., and Mr. Mack at Buffalo. Both will return here to receive the returns.

The polls in New York city opened at six o'clock this morning and will close at six to-night. The same rule holds out in practically every part of the state, and the indications are that the New York State vote will be the first to be flashed over the wires to-night, giving an indication of how the election is to go. This at least will be true of the counties and cities outside of greater New York. Voting machines are extensively used up the state and the results will be known almost as soon as the polls close.

Marysville, Ks., Nov. 3.—W. J. Bryan concluded his campaign of the State of Kansas and of the United States before an enthusiastic audience here last night. It was the last political speech, his address at Lincoln being non-partisan.

Mr. Bryan realized it was the concluding political speech of the campaign, and his peroration was delivered with all the earnestness at his command, and as he declared that he had given an impulse to honest politics, and helped to create a sentiment in favor of reform, he was wildly applauded by the large audience.

The following is the conclusion of the last campaign speech of 1908 made by Mr. Bryan:

"If I enter the White House, I shall enter it free to keep the pledges I have made, free to serve with singleness of purpose."

"If I am elected I shall for four years devote whatever energy I have and whatever ability I possess to the one object of making this Government again a Government in which the people rule and under which every citizen shall draw from society a reward proportionate to the service which he renders to his fellow men."

Youngstown, Ohio, Nov. 3.—The last word of his campaign has been spoken by William Howard Taft, and he left last night for Cincinnati to cast his vote.

"Vote the Republican ticket and preserve properly protection to American industries, business integrity and the rights of labor."

This was the message with which Mr. Taft finished his fight. The six and one-half hour's Judge Taft spent in Youngstown were crowded with political events, replete with the pomp and show of party organizations and a carnival of hilarity, noise and abandon by the populace to the occasion.

Oyster Bay, Nov. 3.—His own feeling of extreme confidence was thus expressed yesterday by President Roosevelt when in speaking of the campaign he declared, "We've got them beaten to a frazzle."

Martyrs of Free Trade.

London, Nov. 3.—The Daily Express deals with the problem of the unemployed and denies that protected countries suffer as badly as free trade Britain suffers when times are hard. "The pitiful unemployed processions in our streets are," it argues, "the condemnation of Cobdenism. Men who might be useful and happy mechanics are demoralized into hopeless casual laborers, each month less capable of any real work. They are the victims of an antediluvian theory—the martyrs of free trade."

Elections In Newfoundland.

St. John's, Nfld., Nov. 2.—General elections were held throughout the colony yesterday, following a bitter campaign.

The Government of Sir Robert Bond is opposed by the People's party, led by Sir Edward Morris, formerly a member of Premier Bond's Cabinet. As the ballots in all the polling places are not counted where they are cast the result of the elections will not be known before to-night.

A Sheriff Arrested.

Oswego, N.Y., Nov. 3.—Henry Hilton, sheriff of Oswego County, was arrested last night on a bench warrant issued by District Attorney Baker on indictments found by a grand jury, charging him with having presented for audit bills alleged to contain false and fraudulent items relating to overcharges for the keep of prisoners.

Fatal Pistol Duel.

Rocky Mount, Va., Nov. 3.—As a result of a pistol duel in the Norfolk and Western Depot between Dr. J. Temple Cahill and Robert Smithers, both prominent, the latter probably will die. H. L. Davis, a bystander, received a wound in the ankle.

Earthquake Far Away.

Ottawa, Nov. 3.—A distant earthquake shock was recorded on the Dominion seismograph at 12:37 yesterday morning. It was probably 4,000 miles away, and may be near Lima, Peru.

Blenheim Boy Drowns.

Chatham, Ont., Nov. 3.—Sidney Burke of Blenheim was drowned yesterday afternoon while boating on Round Bay, 18 miles south of here. His boat was upset by a gust of wind.

TWO MEN ON LIVE WIRES

Alfred Bruce Goes to the Aid of Comrade and Gets 2,200 Volts.

Owen Sound, Nov. 2.—Alfred Bruce and William Myers, members of a range of linemen in the employ of the Bell Telephone Co., were electrocuted Saturday morning. For six hours doctors endeavored to restore animation to Bruce, but without avail, and his recovery is regarded as hopeless. Myers escaped with a badly burned hand.

Myers was putting up clips and was suspended by his belt from one of the wires when his hand came in contact with the power wire carrying a voltage of 2,200. Bruce went to his assistance. He was moving along the wire suspended by his belt when the steel spur on his boot came in contact with the power wire, jerking it and setting Myers free. At the time when his foot struck the power wire Bruce had hold of a ground wire, so that he received a shock of about 5,000 volts. He fell back limp. Both men were removed from their perilous positions by firemen. Bruce was taken to the hospital, where four doctors attended to him.

The two men referred to in the above despatch are well known in Ingersoll, they having spent some time in this town with the Bell Telephone gang during last winter and spring. Alfred Bruce, who was electrocuted, was a member of Samaritan Lodge, I.O.O.F., and his remains will be brought to Ingersoll for interment.

STUDENTS' HALLOWE'EN.

Plans Go Wrong and Night Passes Quietly In Toronto.

Toronto, Nov. 2.—There were 300 police on duty in the city on Saturday night to prevent the students from damaging property. The students were so well watched that they didn't do a thing but make noise, and it is a crowd of outsiders who followed the parade of 300 students down town late at night who are blamed for the destruction of glass worth hundreds of dollars. Plate glass store fronts on Yonge street and numerous house windows on York, Agnes, Elizabeth and other streets were demolished. And there was a single arrest. The "Meds" enjoyed themselves in the early part of the evening by way-laying Arts men escorting young ladies to the dance in the "gym." Nearly every escort had his white shirt-front daubed with blacking and his attire otherwise mauled.

The "Meds" expected to join forces with S.P.S. returning from Buffalo about midnight, but the train was delayed and though the locals waited beside two huge bonfires on the park until after 2 a.m., the forces did not unite.

At Hamilton 30 policemen were hidden in the depot ready to belabor the Science excursionists had they attempted a frolic there.
