Unemployment in Montreal

The situation in Montreal is probably as bad as ever during the past winter. Thousands are out of work, and desperate. Robberies and hold-ups are the order, and are generally accompanied by a show of arms. Socialists are holding street corner meetings and helping in the spread of discontent against the system which makes the worker slave in an inhuman fashion for a few months in the year and starve for the remainder. For three-quarters of an hour this morning a mere slip of a girl address an audience of 1,500 workers from a vantage point in Champ de Mars, and held them spell-bound while she poured forth a torrent of words in the native language spoken by almost every one in the crowd-Russian. When she concluded she was liberally applauded, and escorted by a coterie of her followers to her home.

The girl was Asya Choultz, a niece of Emma Goldman, the world-famous anarchist. She is one of the many fervid Socialists who are engaged in impregnating the seeds of their doctrine in the out-of-works and laborers in Montreal, and for the past year, since she came to Canada from Kharkoff, Russia, she has carried on her propaganda in Montreal.

Capitalism is rapidly cetting itself into a box from which it will have a hard time to escape. Foreigners by the thousands are nouved, into Montreal for the profits they will pay the steamship companies, and for the profits which may be exploited from them by the master class of Canada. These immigrants often have a harder fight for a living than they would have had in their own land. They are divine breeders of discontent, and never fail to take advantage of as opportunity to spread their gospel. rever iail to take advantage of an opportunity to spread their gospel. Their propaganda work, coupled with that of the native Canadian, spells the smash of capitalist rule in Canada-in-a time not far distant.

American Notes

The senate at Washington has passed a bill, the effect of which will be to prevent the acceptance of any more funds from the Rockefeller Educational Board, in the prosecution of General farm demonstration work. Senator Ashurst, in a brief speech attacked both Rockefeller and Carnerie. He said that Rockefeller, Ir. had attempted to debauch an American commonwealth, and the blood of women and children is on the hands of his brutal embloyes. Carnerie also caused the streets of Homestead to run red with blood. "Carnegie and Rockefeller both." said the senator, "not only exploit the American people in the most shameless way, but they treat their own working neople in a most brutal and inhuman fashion."

Labor in general throughout the country is raising its voice in protest against the Colorado horrors. Hundreds of petitions from the locals and district organizations have poured into the executive board of the United Mine Workers of America to declare a general strike as protest against the fiendish acti-of the mine masters and thugs

Bouck White in New York branded the Mexican invasion as a "disgrace to the American flag."

Several hundred men and women of New York at a meeting pledged themselves to send money, guns and ammunition to the striking miners of Colorado.

A free speech fight is again on in Denver, Col. The I.W.W.'s start men speaking at different parts of the city at the same time, and the police have their hands full gathering them all in.

Charles G. Taylor, Socialist, has been elected member of the Grand Rapids, Mich., school board. He received a plurality of 6,565, which is the largest given any candidate elected. Taylor was formerly a school teacher and is now a laborer in a furniture factory.

World Wide Notes

Seven Socialists have been elected to the Argentina Chamber of Deputties. The total Socialist vote in Buenos Aires is said to exceed 100,000. In 1898 only 52 Socialist votes were east in the entire sountry.

Among those elected are Enrique Dickman, editor of La. Vanguardia, the Socialist daily, and Antonio De Tomaso, national secretary of the

party.

Over 4000 women, representing twenty-one of the leading countries of the world, participated in the formal opening of the ouinouennial congress of the International Council of Women, at Rome.

The exact figures of the latest Bul

They show that the Secialists elected 20 members of the national house, equally divided between the Constructive and Radical parties. The Constructive Socialist vete dropped from 54,369 to 47,107 and the Radical Socialist vote from 52,777 to 38,382f. The Democratic party polled 75,000 votes, capturing 28 seats while the two Socialist parties with a combined vote of 85,000 secured but 20 seats. The loss in the Socialist vote is attributed to three causes; some voters could not agree with the Socialist agitation for a republic; others were dissatisfied because the party refused to join the other opposition parties in the formation of a coalition government; while the terrorist tactics of the government frightened many from voting the Socialist ticket.
