Naples, April 8.—The hope that Mount Vesuvius was becoming calm was dissipated to-day, when the volcano became more active than ever. The panic has spread to Naples. Two strong earthquake shocks which shatday. The entire population rushed to the street in terror, many persons crying, "The Madonna has forsaken us!" "The end of the world has come!"

Had Narrow Escapes

They passed last night in the darkness safe from the frequent flashes of lightning, as the gas works and electric light plants were also destroyed. The restaurant of the Funicular railroad, too has been obliterated.

Prisoners in jails on the mountain side went mad with terror and mutinied They were only partially quieted by being brought here. Their fears released. have been communicated to the prisoners here, who may rebel at any moment. The situation is critical.

Breathing is momentarily becoming more difficult because of poisonous umes and smoke, while hot ashes which are still falling tend to make life a burden.

Contrary to expectations, the sea has not yet shown signs of being affected by the phenomenon, but fears are entertained that tidal waves may yet come, and many craft have put to sea. Visitors to Naples are avoiding the notels on the sea front, and the people living there are beginning to leave for higher altitudes.

The Pope's Message,

Rome, April 8.—Pope Pius is greatly distressed by the calamity wrought by the eruption of Mount Vesuvius. In talking to his secretary to-day, he said: "There are moments when my imprionment is irksome."

His Holiness personally will not be able to go to the scene, but he has sent a letter to Cardinal Prisco, archbishop of Naples, expressing his grief for the sufferers by the disaster, and instructing him to distribute relief among them and to send to the Vatican particulars of the eruption. He also gave the apostolic benediction to the faithful. Pitiful Scenes.

St. Petersburg, April 7.-A panic has been created in government circles by the surprising strength developed by \$3,000,000. The Liszt Plano Company and drastic consequences. Representatives of Men Believe Employers Will Submit a Proposal Regarding Arbitration.

ADDITIONAL RETURNS OF RUSSIAN ELECTION

St. Petersburg Paper Warns Government that it Must Now Listen to Voice of the People.

St. Petersburg, April 9.-Belated returns to-day only increased the magnitude of the opposition's victory, Kursk returned a solid progressive delegation headed by Prince Peter Dolgoroukoff. M. Sherkoff, one of the members elected to the lower house of parliament is now in prison: Vitebsk elected two Poles, one a Catholic priest. and one a progressive, two constitutional democrats and two peasants. Vladimir, one of the old capitals of Russia, where the orthodox faith is particularly strong, chose a monarchist, but the electoral college elected five

constitutional delegates.

Tula is the only province except Moscow which elected a majority of Conservatives. The result in Moscow province constitutes an anomaly in the peasants in the electoral college by The bargain was so distasteful to M. Shipoff, the prominent Zemstvo leader, and Michetverikoff that they declined to be parties to it withdrawing their candidature and also induced the Constitutional Democrats to withdraw their ticket, which includes Prince Paul Delgoroukoff, Prince Galitizin, M. Kokoshkine, Prof. Mourmtseff and M. Sotovin. As a net result the province of Moscow, the real heart of Russia, sends to parliament comparatively unknown men, two peasant workmen, Prince Bashoff, M. Kreadnar and

Peter Strube. The Reich (organ of the constitutional democrats) terms it a splendid victory, and referring to the election of men like M. Peterunkvitch and M. Boditcheff, who first demanded a constitution for Russia, and Prince Shakovski, who gave a fortune to aid the liberation movement, the paper points out that these are the very people whose ideas the Emperor twelve years ago called foolish dreams. The Reich then issued a solemn warning as follows: "If Count Witte last November had had a little feeling, and had listened to the words of Peterunkvitch the world would not have witnessed the horrors of the present revolution. The voice of the people becomes clearer and louder daily. If the government does not listen to it, the country is destined to pass through a cataclysm a hundred fold worse than anything heretofore."
