
Journey. (Special Correspondence.) Prince Rupert, Jan. 14. - After a lonely tramp on foot of over 100 miles on the frozen surface of the Skeena river, with the thermometer 20 below zero, and the cold north wind at times Got Safely Ashore taking him off his feet, C. A. Lillesburg, a Kitsumkalum lumberman, finished a long and tiresome journey from that place when he hobbled into town on Sunday night, foot-sore and weary. The trip was the hardest he had ever made, and under no circumstances would he undertake it again. Until he perpendicular.

While rounding one of these points sudden gust of wind and swept out upon the thin ice which bent and cracked beneath him. Lying prostrate so as to distribute his weight and prevent the ice from breaking, he was swept across the thinly-covered surface and reached the other side in safety.

Mr. Lillesburg owns a saw-mill at Kitsumkalum and reports doing a good ousiness. The railway camps along the Skeena have created a demand for lumber and his mill has been kept running steadily until last week, when the Skeena froze over and he was forced to shut down the plant. The men are now all engaged in logging and in the spring the mill will be started up again. While two large rafts of lumber for the railway camps were being floated down stream they were caught by the cold snap and frozen in the ice. The rafts aggregate many thousand feet of lumber, all of which will be a total loss.
