SCOTT ACT.—The election for the repeal of the Scott Act in Charlotte county will be held on November 17th. The act has been in force there since 1860.

BOOKS UP.—A steady load of books of the 13th says the schooner "Etna" from Miramichi has entirely broken up. The beach is strewn with books and other wreckage.

THE FALL ARRANGEMENT on the L. C. R. and Canada Eastern, went into effect Monday. The time table published on our North page is therefore cancelled and trains are now running on the table on 3rd page.

THE COUNTY COURT, Hon. Judge Wilkinson presiding, met on Tuesday and adjourned sine die yesterday forenoon, after disposing of several cases, some of which were undecided.

CALL.—At a meeting of St. Paul's Presbyterian congregation, Fredericton, on Monday evening, it was decided to extend a call to the pastorate to Rev. W. McDonald, of Hampton. Four candidates were proposed, Mr. McDonald getting 80 out of 113 votes.

TERMINAL FALL.—When the bark Argentin, from Montreal for Moncton, was off Magdalen Islands the other day, Capt. Samuel West went aloft to assist in shortening sail. Half way out on the weather arm he lost his balance and fell to the deck and dashed his brains out.

THE LUMBER CUT on the Restigouche this year will be between four or five millions of spruce, and about five or six millions of cedar. The cut of spruce will therefore be much smaller than last year, and that of cedar very much larger. The manufacturing of shingles has become quite an industry on the North Shore.

SHINGLES MADE.—David Richards is shortly to commence the erection of a shingle mill just below Campbellton, on the line of the L. C. R. Mr. Richards who has been lumbering on the Restigouche for some years is developing an extensive business in that section.

CHURCHY.—Wm. McLaggan, one of the most prominent residents of Blackville, died suddenly, of apoplexy, at his residence in that place on Wednesday last week. Few men in Northumberland county were better known or better appreciated for sterling integrity and thorough independence of character.

TO REBUILD.—The St. Lawrence Lumber Company will rebuild their mill at Bathurst. Men are now engaged in clearing away the debris of the late fire from the site of the destroyed mill and the new establishment is to be completed by the opening of navigation next spring. It is to be built with all the modern improvements and will be one of the most efficient lumber mills in the Dominion.

SHIPWRECKED MARINERS.—The captain and crew of the bark Carola, wrecked on Bryan Island—one of the Magdalen—reached Chatham on Saturday last. Some Chatham men have taken into a warehouse, where Capt. Wright had stored some of his effects saved from the wreck and got away with them. Our policemen are apparently not alive to their full duty in looking after Chatham's worst characters.

IMPROVED.—Jas. J. Pierce, Esq., who is a veteran among the North Shore newspaper men, has had editorial charge of the Newcastle Advocate for the last two weeks, while its publisher, Mr. Anslow, has been away on a collecting trip. SMALL POX.—Last week's Campbellton Pioneer says:—As soon as the health officers of the town, learned of the two cases of smallpox in a settlement near St. Moine on the line of L. C. R. about 75 miles from here, the provincial board at Fredericton was notified of the facts by wire. Since then the board and Dr. Doherty, inspector of the board of health for the county, have been in correspondence, and no doubt every necessary precaution will be exercised to stay the spread of the disease.

A WARE.—A dispatch to the Quebec Signal Service from Superintendent Campbell, of St. Paul's Island, dated October 16, 6 p. m., says:—Large quantities of wreckage and timber are west of St. Paul's Island this evening. The cargo consists of all sizes of scuttles, docking, knees, etc., which have been washed ashore all broken up. One empty four barrel which has come ashore is marked "A. R. & Co. Hx." It looks as if a collision had occurred within twenty miles of the island.

GUYS.—This is the gun season. Out on the different counties roads the loaded partridges and down along the coast they are loaded for wild-geese, brant, black and other ducks. Brant and ducks are reported quite plentiful, but wild geese have not come in correspondence, and no doubt every necessary precaution will be exercised to stay the spread of the disease.

An Unfortunate Affair.

The death of a man named Leacock at Campbellton, which took place a few weeks ago, places Mr. Daniel Desmond, formerly of Chatham, but for several years a popular hotel proprietor in the former town in a very embarrassing position. It appears that Leacock was in the habit of leaving about the hotel, and one day, while Mr. Desmond was looking after some men who were making alterations or repairs on his premises, he found him in his way and ordered him to leave. Leacock did not do so, but he was not a violent man, and when Desmond intimated that he would use force in ejecting him from the hotel, Leacock made for a pickaxe, whereupon Desmond picked up a piece of board and dealt him a blow somewhat about the neck, which disabled him. Unfortunately, Leacock never recovered from the blow, but died in a week or two after he was inflicted. Naturally enough, the man's relatives seek to have satisfaction for his death and have caused criminal proceedings to be taken against Desmond. The coroner's jury found that the man's death resulted from the blow he received, and while that is, doubtless, correct, those who know the latter and, of course, regret the fatality, cannot help sympathizing with him in the awkward position in which he has been placed. No one there who was struck the fatal blow, to say nothing of the fact that he would have been taking the most extreme course in view of the weapon with which his own stock was threatened by the deceased. POOR OUTLOOK.—There is undoubtedly a great deal of present and prospective distress among the work-day classes of this city, after the dull season through which we have just passed, and the outlook at the beginning of our long and severe winter is far from being bright or reassuring. All who can get away have gone, but there are thousands remaining to whom the first fall of snow will bring want and misery, without a ray of hope to cheer the dreary prospect, unless our men in authority come to their aid with the employment which is so necessary to keep the wolf from the door.—Quebec Telegraph.

COAT IS SCARC.—A good many house-holders are without their usual winter supply. The cause of the shortage seems to be due to the business having been "cut up" last season, three or four going into it a ragsman's way, with the result that there was more of certain kinds of coat than could be got rid of and some of it had to be held until this year. This year, each of the "dealers" imported cautiously, the result being that the supply is short—especially of anthracite. If some person, understanding the business properly, would establish a fuel yard, and keep a stock of both wood and coal constantly on hand, the enterprise would, doubtless, be a paying one in Chatham.

WILKES TO FIND GAME.—The north shore and the upper St. John are favorite resorts of the hunters this year. Partridge, duck and geese are to be found in large quantities along the Restigouche from Campbellton to Dalhousie. On the Quebec shore for instance, geese are more plentiful than they have been for twenty years. The river is practically dotted with them. Further up the Restigouche are duck and partridge in abundance. On a portage road, about thirty miles from Campbellton, one hunter is known to have shot thirty-three partridges between the hours of 7.30 and 9.30. On the Duganovon and Bartholomew in Northumberland, partridges are plentiful, and on the lakes about there are large numbers of duck. On the plains of Bartholomew there are lots of geese. In Victoria partridges are said to be more plentiful than for years.—Gleaner.

PERSONAL.—V. C. Milner, Esq., collector of customs, Sackville, was in town on Tuesday. He is an old newspaper man, though not advanced in years. While he doesn't, for a moment, hint that he feels at all uncomfortable at the receipt of em's, he admits that he found it very trying, at first, to refrain from newspaper work.

Mr. R. B. Bennett, late of Hon. Mr. Tweed's office, and now of Dalhousie Law School, Halifax, is a member of the government in the mock parliament of that institution. He quotes Tennyson in his speeches and leaves the figures to his colleagues.

Death of Mrs. Robert Barker.

Big Boots.

Under a displayed heading, "The Biggest Yet," the Fredericton Gleaner says:—"A tarpin is to be shown at Kingsclere fair that is twenty-five inches in circumference. It was raised by Mr. Mills of that place."

That's a fairly big turnip, but it isn't worth boasting of. When our reporter read the paragraph he said "I saw some turnips, parsnips, and carrots from the Station Farm, Chatham, at Dr. Pallen's and the Snowball stores, and think we can beat the Kingsclere turnip," so he went around the block and measured and weighed some of them. They were found to be as follows:—

TURNIPS. Circumference. Weight. No. 1 38 in. 173 lbs. No. 2 31 " 134 " No. 3 29 " 115 "

MANGEL-WURZELS. Circumference. Length. Weight. No. 1 20 inches 21 inches 11 lbs. No. 2 18 " 18 " 8 " No. 3 16 " 14 " 7 "

There were, also, four carrots of smooth growth and symmetrical form, each of which was 12 inches in circumference, and the four weighed eight and a half pounds. There were bigger and heavier carrots in the crop, but they were misshapen.

The mangels came from a quarter acre plot of ground which yielded one hundred and ten barrels, while the turnip and carrot plots yielded an equally liberal crop. The above figures are of course reliable, and we give to show that the North is, at least, not behind other parts of New Brunswick in the production of root crops.

The Fredericton Govt.

A Barker House guest arrived from Fredericton the other evening and said he heard the proprietor was away at Ottawa superintending the removal of one of the basement walls of the Parliament Building, so as to extend the House of Commons restaurant by means of a subway to the Russell House.

He said he saw a stout, almost round gentleman with a soft hat on, in the Barker House office, who told him that Mr. Coleman was also engaged for the season at Ottawa, to direct the carvers, fresco painters, glaziers and general decorators in their work of renovating and remodeling the Commons hall, so as to remove the objections of scandal witnesses and others to being summoned to it. He said the stout man with a soft hat, and a number of his disaffected door mat, which he had, only a few minutes before, pulled in through the ladies' entrance with a good deal of to do. The end that looked as if it had sustained a compound fracture in a thrashing mill, and was moist and slimy, was the part on which the internal economy of the hall had a 24-inch grip. The gentleman told him also that at the time the macerated matter was removed, the end of it had been surrounded by two feet of debris had become entwined about the debris of an umbrella, a pipe-organ, a piece of flannel, a hitching-chain, a pair of suspenders, two pairs of moccasins, and other personal property which the guest had appropriated after he had escaped from his barracks quarters. Heavy Fire at Bathurst.

A few minutes past midnight on Monday night an alarm was given at Bathurst, consequent upon the discovery of fire in the basement of the H. M. Graham & Co. store on Water street.

A fresh north-east wind fanned the flames which soon burned fiercely, communicating with Mr. Jas. Hickson's watch and jewelry shop and John Duncanson's saloon. The crowd that had gathered looked apalled for checking the conflagration and mainly assisted in removing the contents of the burning buildings and of those threatened. From the three buildings named the fire spread to the street and burned Mrs. Sinclair's confectionery and fancy goods store, Jas. Hickson's residence, the building occupied by the Merchants' Bank and McKenna Bros' tailoring establishment, the residence of K. F. Burns, Esq., M. P., and also the Skating and Curling rink. Powers' hotel took fire and was badly damaged, but a determined fight stopped the flames there once and sent a conflagration that seriously threatened to destroy a large portion of the town. As it is, great damage was done. The St. Lawrence Lumber Company's fine store, office and warehouses were scorched and the large plate glass windows cracked badly with the great heat from the fire across the street.

The St. John Globe says nearly all the insurances on the destroyed properties are held in that city and as it could learn, they were as follows:—

"K. F. Burns, \$5,000 in the Western on dwelling and furniture; Miss Meahan, \$600 on building in Royal Canadian, \$1,800 on building and stock in the Citizens, \$1,000 on stock in the British Americans, \$800 on stock in the Liverpool & London & Globe; Charles Meahan, \$500 in Western on house and barn; Jas. Hickson, \$800 on dwelling

in the Western; Henry Kerr, \$350 on dwelling and store in the Western; Michael Power, hotel, \$500 in the Western. The bank was insured for \$1,000 in the Liverpool, London & Globe and the Life Assurance Association had \$200 on the office furniture. The Norwich Union had also \$1,000 on the Meahan stock."

The St. Lawrence Lumber Company's loss is covered by insurance.

The fire is supposed to have been of incendiary origin.

Sons' misadventure—during the progress of the fire—placed some inflammable material under the platform of Mr. Samuel Bishop's store, whither a lot of goods, etc., had been removed from the burning buildings for safe keeping, and set fire to it. It was however seen in time to be extinguished. Newcastle was on the point of sending an engine and some workers to assist Bathurst, in the emergency, when news of the fire being under control was received.
