MONTREAL, Oct. 12.—William Strachan of Gilt Edge soap renowned, died this morning in the general hospital of kidney trouble at the age of 83 years.

PARIS, Oct. 13.—The revelations resulting from the publication in Germany of the late Chancellor Von Holnstein's "Reichsbriefe" continue to make a great stir in France on account of the allegations thrown upon Germany's policy toward the republic and today in connection with the centenary tomorrow, the question of the battle of Jena which opened the gates of Berlin to the victorious French army, the newspapers here are filled with articles on the subject.

GENEVA, Oct. 13.—An amusing abduction occurred recently at St. Augustine on the Swiss-German frontier near Basle, where a wealthy retired merchant named Felix, was arrested for a charge of carrying off a girl, but was liberated as soon as the fact of the case became known to the police.
