## FISH AND GAME BILL AMENDED

**New Section Dealing with Appointment of Game Wardens—The Street Railway and Kings County Extension.**

Fredericton, April 6.—Before the Corporations Committee this morning, the bill to incorporate the New Brunswick Forest, Fish and Game Protection Association was agreed to, with an amendment that the appointment of forest, fish and game wardens will be made by the Surveyor-General on the recommendation of the Association, but such wardens shall be subject to and under the control of the Surveyor-General as well as of the Association.

The bill to enable the St. John Railway Company to extend its light and power lines into the county of Kings was stood over until this afternoon, when an amendment will be submitted whereby extension of the company's lines will be limited to the parishes of Rothesay and Westfield and to Hampton.

The bill to incorporate Eel River Light, Heat and Power Co. was considered. Mr. Hazen suggested that a provision be inserted in the bill whereby the lumbermen operating on Eel River should be fully protected, and also that a provision be inserted requiring the company to pay to the province \$150 annual rental for the use of the river and also 6 per cent. of the net earnings.

A delegation from the town of Shediac, consisting of Mayor McDonald and Ald. White and Legere and Town Clerk W. A. Russell, is here in connection with the bill to amend the town's incorporation act. They are accompanied by C. Lionel Hanington, Dorchester, and this morning an agreement was arrived at regarding the bill, which was satisfactory to the parties interested.

The bill is in connection with the disqualification of aldermen and the consequent inability to hold meetings of the town council. Shediac sought to limit the powers of the Mayor in regard to the appointment of a returning officer for the civic election and to confer the power on a majority of the qualified aldermen, and it was also sought to reduce the number constituting a quorum, but under the agreement arrived at the act will remain as formerly.

The Hydro-Electric Company's bill will come before the Corporations Committee this afternoon, its consideration having been postponed from this morning.

Lieutenant Governor Tweedie will visit the legislature this evening at 8 o'clock to assent to a number of bills.

This afternoon and this evening the legislature will be engaged in taking up bills in committee of the whole.

The special committee to consider proposed changes in the election law to give pure elections in the province met this morning and considered the proposed bill submitted by the Electoral Purty League of Westernland county.

After the meeting, Premier Hazen said the committee were of the opinion the bill would prove ineffective and that the Westernland organization were being asked to send a delegation here to discuss the matter.

## HON. MR. GRIMMER AND MR. TWEEDDALE

**Lively Passage Between Them at the Meeting of the Public Accounts Committee, Yesterday.**

Fredericton, April 6.—The public accounts committee spent most of this morning taking up the affairs of the Blue Bell tract.

Mr. Tweeddale asserted that Mr. Melville was "only fooling his time away while drawing \$3.50 per day and expenses from the province for the building of a road through the Blue Bell tract."

The surveyor general went fully into the matter and gave the information that before entering upon the work of building the road he had had Grand Trunk Pacific engineers make an estimate as to the cost per mile of opening up and constructing that piece of road about seven miles and his estimate was \$850 per mile. The actual cost under the system his department had adopted, was less than \$700 per mile.

A lively passage took place between Mr. Tweeddale and the surveyor general, when the former appealed to the surveyor to pay the fees of his witnesses in the famous Stevenson investigation.

Mr. Grimmer told him that he ought to pay his own witnesses and he ought to be thankful that he had never brought the report of the investigation into the House.

Mr. Robinson had Chief Engineer Wetmore of the board of works, called this morning for a few minutes and instructed him to be on hand tomorrow with all the documents and facts in connection with Chipman bridge.

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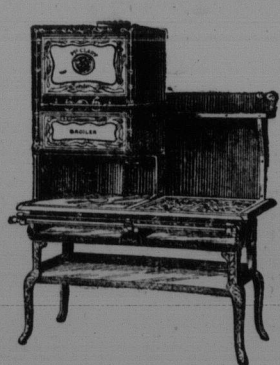
