UPWARD COURSE  
OF MARKET IS  
RESUMED

New York, Sept. 24.—After backing and filling within a narrow range for the first four hours today, the market suddenly resumed its upward course in the last hour incidentally showing more high records for the year.

The balance of the market moved in harmony with the copper, although some of the standard railroad issues were relatively backward. Both Reading and Lehigh Valley pointed to demand toward the close, with equal strength in Louisville and Nashville, Atlantic Coast Line, Canadian Pacific and Chicago and North Western.

United States Steel, common, which bore signs of selling pressure early in the day, while the preferred shares were conspicuously strong, suddenly rose a full point on heavy dealings.

Independent steel issues such as Colorado Fuel, Bethlehem Steel and Republic rose 1 to 2 points. Various specialties including Woolworth, Studebaker, Mexican Petroleum and American Hide and Leather preferred, made similar gains. A one point gain in American Can was the feature of the strong and active close.

London sold some 15,000 shares of steel, chiefly Coppers and Steel. The monetary situation at that centre was responsible for some uneasiness, although discounts were unchanged.

Money rose to five per cent. again here, but most loans were made under that rate. Time money was easier, practically all dates shading 14 per cent. Borrowers were nudged to hold off, because of the "lavory" situation, while lenders were awaiting a recurrence of stronger conditions.

Stock market was active, broad and firm, with moderately large dealings. Total sales, par value, were \$2,500,000.
