S. S. Grampian Docked Yesterday

Brought Total of 1,467 Passengers Including 430 Officers and Men

Warm Reception Given All by Band and Committees. Though not expected until today, the S. S. Grampian docked at berth three shortly after five o'clock yesterday afternoon.

There was a total of 1,467 passengers on board, of whom 381 were cabin class, 288 were children, 80 were officers and slightly over 250 were returned waiting men.

It was almost an hour after the boat docked that the gannet was run up and for some time there was speculation as to whether the passengers would be allowed to land or not as the yellow flag was flying at the foremast head.

While waiting for the plank to go up the passengers were entertained by the garrison band, and apples and other comforts were thrown aboard by the members of the various reception committees.

Shortly after six o'clock the first passengers descended and from then on it was a steady stream of soldiers, wives and children, all of whom were splendidly cared for by the different committees. The soldiers and dependents for New Brunswick and other maritime provinces were the first to be cleared through the immigration and military departments.

Colds were frequent and there was so much seasickness among the men, that returning nursing sisters who have completed their tasks overseas were called into service during the voyage. There were two births at sea. On April 13, a little girl, christened Madeline Marie, was born to Pte. and Mrs. J. Germaine, of Ottawa. Mrs. Germaine is a Parisian, and her husband has been in Canada but a short time before the outbreak of war. Five days after the above happy event a child was born to Pte. and Mrs. H. Major E. R. Turner Winner of Honors

Men—Plan Has Been Abandoned—Regular Despersal Area Plan Continued.

It had been planned that the original Canadian division would return to Canada en toto and with that point in view several staff officers were dispatched to Canada to see that all arrangements were made at the various dispersal headquarters.

The officer sent to St. John to prepare for the coming of the men of the 1st Battalion was Major E. R. Turner, M. C., D. C. M., who arrived in the city Saturday night from Halifax where he had arrived on the 1st of April. Before the vessel docked, however, he had been informed by the Canadian military authorities in England that the 1st Battalion above had been abandoned and the men would return and resume civil life under the regular dispersal area plan used for ordinary military soldiers.

From Georgetown, where he was working on the Valley Railroad, Mr. Turner sailed for St. John on the 1st of April. He was met at the wharf by Col. Guthrie. Arriving at Valcartier he was transferred to the engineering corps of the 2nd Field Artillery and went to France with that unit in February, 1915, with the rank of sergeant.

In April, 1915, he won the Distinguished Conduct Medal at the second battle of Ypres and three months later at the Ploegsteert scrap was severely wounded by a German sniper. In August, 1915, he was promoted to company sergeant major and a month later he had the stars on his shoulder consisting of two bars, the Victoria Cross, school children, etc., and the place will be in holiday attire. BATHURST MIGHTY PROUD OF ACTING SGT. HERMAN GOOD

Plans Big Reception for Victoria Cross Man Who is Returning Home on Olympic Holiday for Bathurst.

On the list of New Brunswick returned men furnished by Charles Robinson, secretary of the New Brunswick Returned Soldiers' Commission is acting Sergeant Herman James Good, Bathurst, who is the only Victoria Cross man wearing the Victoria Cross among the First Division men who are coming home on the S. S. Olympic, which will arrive in Halifax Tuesday.

Sergeant Good was awarded the Victoria Cross for most conspicuous bravery at Hangard Wood, August 8th last, during the first of the Amiens offensive, when in the attack his company was held up by heavy fire from three machine guns which were seriously delaying the advance. Realizing the gravity of the situation, this hero dashed forward alone, killing several of the garrison and captured a battery of 8.9 guns which were in action at the time. Collecting three of his section he charged the battery under point blank fire and captured the entire crews of the three guns.
