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"ADS." WILL BOOM TRADE FOR SHIPS OF AMERICA

Fleet Corporation Decides to Spend \$90,000 for a Publicity Campaign.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 22.—To stimulate business for American passenger ships operated by the Shipping Board of the Emergency Fleet Corporation has appropriated provisionally \$90,000 for an advertising campaign.

The appropriation made by the trustees, says a statement issued by this corporation today, "is tentative. The expenditure of the entire amount will depend upon developments. An accurate record will be kept of the results of each advertisement after the manner of commercial advertising, and the sum spent will be subject to revision in accordance with the returns. The progress of the campaign will be reviewed monthly by the board of trustees of the Emergency Fleet Corporation. There are at present four lines affected by this enterprise. They are operating twenty-three Government-owned passenger steamers, scheduled to make 141 round voyages in the next twelve months.

Advertising men will be interested to know that to repay the appropriation to the Government only 1,000 additional decisions to travel abroad will have to be created by the Fleet Corporation in the coming year. This is at the rate of one decision to a city of 100,000 people.

Through the advertisements it is expected to create a new group of trans-oceanic travellers. The wording of the advertisements will be specific rather than general and they will contain information of value. For instance, it will bring to the attention of the American traveller that an American line is in operation to South America, one of whose steamships has cut the voyage to Rio de Janeiro to 11 days 8 hours, and to Buenos Aires to 15 days 17 hours, and that another American passenger vessel has broken all records for crossing the Pacific.

Since June 13 the number of employees of the Emergency Fleet Corporation has been reduced from 8,325 to 5,682, and the annual payroll from \$18,377,838 to \$11,829,638. Joseph W. Powell, president and general manager, says the present Washington force will be decreased, although the transfer to Washington of offices now in other places will probably result in increasing the actual number of workers in Washington.

In the Washington headquarters on June 15 were 2,094 employees, said Mr. Powell. At present this force numbers 1,625, with an annual payroll of \$3,816,690. The comptroller's department has received the largest cut of all—from 3,866 on June 1 to 1,750 employees.

Bergdoll Papers Stolen At Capital Thief Enters Office of Congressman Johnson at Washington and Takes Box

Washington, Oct. 21.—Nearly a thousand copies of a House committee report on the escape of G. C. Bergdoll, the draft dodger, and a big wooden box containing certain Bergdoll documents together with many private letters and papers were stolen last night from the office of Representative Ben Johnson (Ky.), Democrat.

The theft of the reports, written by Mr. Johnson and printed at his own expense, was not discovered until late today, while the Washington police were still trying to get on the trail of the thieves by examination of finger prints on the money package. One of which was partially removed. Entering the window of the office, on the main floor of the House Office Building and adjacent to the House post office, the thieves declared it could not be seen from the street. They stole articles of pecuniary value and the room was not ransacked.

Maritimers of West Held Reunion At Calgary

New Brunswick Boys Took Leading Part in Pleasant Occasion.

(By JEFFREY DINGMAN) Calgary, Alberta, October 21.—"I firmly believe that the greatest asset that a young man or young woman can have is life in poverty. Not the grinding poverty of absolute destitution, but that poverty that inspires the noble and praiseworthy desire to work and achieve great things in the eye of the world and keen appreciation of the liabilities and responsibilities and obligations of the future."

Such were the words of the Right Hon. R. B. Bennett, newly appointed Minister of Justice in the rejuvenated Melghen Cabinet, and a native of New Brunswick, at a gigantic and elaborately arranged reunion held by Maritimers, held in the C. P. R. hotel here the other night.

The lesson that we can take from this gathering tonight is that we must stand true to the faith of our forefathers, those great pioneers of New Brunswick and other Maritime Provinces, who, through the long years of trials and tribulations, troubles and anxieties that would kill the ordinary man, had that great and noble and clear-sighted vision of the future that paved the way to our present New Brunswick. And another thing. The first lieutenant in the Liberal camp is W. S. Fielding, a native of Nova Scotia. He further stated that those from the Maritime Provinces, and especially those from New Brunswick, had always led in the conduct of national affairs.

The theme of the remainder of the speeches of the evening had to do with the glories of the Maritime Provinces and of the honor that had been conferred on New Brunswick, in the appointment of R. B. Bennett to the portfolio of Minister of Justice in the new Melghen Cabinet. Mr. Justice Hyndman, a native of Prince Edward Island, stated that in his opinion the position of Federal Minister of Justice was the most important portfolio in the whole Cabinet, and that Calgary and New Brunswick alike should share in the honor of the appointment.

One essential and outstanding feature that has made the people of New Brunswick, and the other Maritime Provinces a prominent factor in the life of the nation is that they were born poor. And it earnestly behooves the course of his address. "We were born poor, but poor only in the materialistic goods of the commercial world. New Brunswick and other maritimers were born and inherited a rich and overflowing abundance in moral strength and courage and in intellectual accomplishment. Within the stern rock-bound precincts of the province, they are brought up in the aroma and atmosphere of a religion as stern and as unyielding as the very rocks which form a measure of their habitable space. And it earnestly behooves the same God-fearing religion is still the best for the sons of man. Does it even occur to you that we have great responsibilities and obligations to the future and the future generations of this great Canada of ours? We who live in a land where it is far easier to wrest a living and a fortune are too apt to think only of the present day and let tomorrow look after itself. Let us, like those great pioneers of that big little province that gave me birth, gain a broad and generous vision of the days to be and with that big lofty and awe-inspiring courage which was characteristic of them, go forward to the praiseworthy end of a greater and a better Canada. This is not a moment for adulation or vain rejoicing, but a moment for the sensing of true obligations and responsibilities."
