The Temora's crew safe...
After three hours pumping there was 4 ft. of water. The gate increased, and fell. At 3 next morning, vessel unmanageable, sighted South Wolf light-house on weather bow, wind S. S. E. Not being able to weather, squared away, and at 5 o'clock anchored in chain parted, vessel backed to Green Rock, then first, quarter torn out, rudder smashed, and boat destroyed. One of the crew got ashore with a line and the remainder of the crew were landed with it. Mr. Cline, the lighthouse keeper, seeing the vessel drifting off shore and supposing the crew had landed, came to their relief, and while under his care, they received the best of treatment. They were there 14 days. W. Cline, a St. Andrew's pilot, son of the lighthouse keeper, landed them at Eastport. The British Consul sent them to this city, where they arrived at 10 o'clock this morning by the steamer New Brunswick. The following are the names of the crew: Samuel Scott, Captain; Wm. Scott, mate; Michael McNeill, Henry Prince, Wm. Campbell and Hugh Wilson, cook and steward.

British and Foreign.

LONDON, Dec. 31.
Cardwell, Secretary of War, at a public meeting, spoke in favor of the new ballot law and the result of arbitration at Geneva, and that there was no longer a cloud between England and America. He alluded to the plan for localization of the army with the militia, and declared himself in favor of the short term of enlistment. It is alleged that Prince Alphonse, brother of Don Carlos, has assumed command of the Carlist forces in the Po area again rising. The British steamer Sparrow Hawk has been ordered to Honolulu.

New York, Jan. 1.
The British schooner Louisa A., from Cape Breton for Boston, put into Newport on Tuesday with loss of deckload of logwood and her sails and main boom. The vessel Columbus, which arrived at New York on Tuesday, from Newport, reported two deaths among the passengers, the deaths resulting from a variety of diseases. Colli's wine was manufactured at Hartford, was burned last night. Loss \$75,000.

Eight of the finest stores and an unoccupied hotel were burned at Glasgow, Ill., on Tuesday last. Loss \$100,000.

The first of the year at Orange, N. J., on Tuesday, was a day of rain. The crops, except property valued at \$700,000. Several steamers at Cincinnati have been caught in the ice and damaged to a considerable extent.
