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Edward Island. He was emphatically an earnest, active, useful and devoted man. To the young people, in his respective Circuits, he was warmly attached, manifesting a special interest in their welfare, and delighting to engage them in Missionary and other religious enterprises, so that it was said at his death, "The children will miss him." He was extremely patient under his severe affliction, and although, on account of his great sufferings, unable to converse much, whatever he did say afforded satisfactory evidence that his feet were on the Rock of Ages; and his brethren have the fullest confidence that he has

"Found the rest they toil to find,
Landed in the arms of God."

3. WILLIAM DUTTON, a young man of great promise, who, after laboring in Newfoundland for a short period, was unexpectedly called to his reward in heaven. He was greatly beloved by all who had the pleasure of his acquaintance. He was a faithful, zealous, devoted servant of Christ, and in his death the Church has sustained a great loss.
