The people of Canada should remember that when they send a man to represent them in Parliament, that they commit to that man their dearest privileges, and if he is ready to saerifice every particle of justice, honor and honesty, to gain Ministerial favor, which is but the common in this country, the people who sent him there will find out their mistake when it is too late; but let them mark such a member, and let them also mark all the corrupt votes he gives in Parliament, and when they come again to exercise their elective franchise, let them leave such at home, where he will have it in his power to do less mischief, and they should pledge every member which they shall effect to do all in his power, in his place in Parliament to repeal the Militia Bill, no matter what the political creed of the electors may be—whether Conservatives or Reformers, they are all equally interested in repealing a Bill which is a disgrace to the country, and a lasting shame to those who made it a law.
