With regard to the report of the committee of the Assembly of Lower Canada, it was no doubt a public document, and if pressed for its production, he did not feel that he should have any grounds for refusing it. He trusted, however, that the honorable member would not press for it, as the production of it would only tend to perpetuate a dispute between the late governor of the colony and the House of Assembly, that he (Sir George Grey) was in hopes was fast dying away."

It further appears by the same report in the Times newspaper of the 29th of June, of the debates of the House of Commons on the preceding evening, that at a subsequent period of the sitting, Lord Ebrington made a motion which was acceded to without debate, for the production of Lord Aylmer's despatches of the 5th of March, 1834, addressed to the Right Honorable Edward Stanley; and of the 18th of March, 1835, addressed to the Earl of Aberdeen.
