to go and see if I could arrange it in Ottawa. I tried in all ways I could but never succeeded in getting what I wanted. At this stage of the game my wife was sick and I didn't have any money to pay the bills. I filled all the papers at my regiment but they reported they couldn't pay anything for me at all. I went to Sparks Street with my document when they were all prepared and they told me to go back to my regiment and that they would look after it. I received my papers after a month and they refused to pay anything. I had to pay it out a my own pocket. At this stage of the game I had about \$200. worth of debts for doctors, medicine and everything else and all sorts of other payments. When I saw this I was discouraged and everything else and that's why I went A. W. L. I came

back by myself because things were going a little better at home. My wife is sick again and I am very discouraged about it. I expect my wife to be sick again and I still haven't any money to pay for it and that's why I went A.W.L. Everything I have said is absolutely true.

- Q. You told me about an incident which happed in Hull on the 5th of January, 1945, will you tell the Court about that?
  - A. I am not able to talk about that.
- Q. The reason you gave us about your wife are they the sole reasons you had to absent yourself without leave?
- A. Those are my reasons for going A.W.L. and I have spoken under cath that that is true. If there is a possibility I would like the clemency of the Court.
  - Q. Have you ever been warned for draft?
  - A. Never.
