WINTERBOURNE.

A post village of the township of Woolwich, situated on Cox's Creek, eight miles from Berlin, the county seat, and seventy miles from Toronto. It was first settled in 1854, and laid out by Charles Allen. Cox's Creek furnishes a good water power here, with fourteen feet fall. The village contains one store, two hotels, one flouring mill, one saw mill, two schools, one common school under the charge of John Scollon, and a private school kept by Miss Brittan. There are three churches, viz.:—Established Church of Scotland, Free Church, and Wesleyan Methodist. The Established Church was erected in 1838, of frame, at a cost of \$2,000, Rev. James Thom minister. The Free Church is a frame building, built at a cost of \$800; no settled pastor. The Wesleyan Methodist Church was built in 1856, of stone, and cost \$1,500. Population 200—Mails daily.
