

SACKVILLE ACADEMY.—We learn from the Annual Catalogue of this popular Institution (which has lately issued from our press, ornamented by a beautiful copperplate print, exhibiting a view of the Academy Building and the adjacent grounds,) that, during the year 1847, the total number of Students was 144—namely, in the Classical Department, 60; in the Literary and Scientific Department, 46; and in the Primary Department, 35. The numbers in the different classes were as follows:—In Greek, 36; Latin, 59; French, 63; Mental Philosophy, 9; Logic, 9; Astronomy, 25; Natural Philosophy, 9; Chemistry, 16; Surveying and Navigation, 25; Geometry, 42; Algebra, 35; English Grammar, 84; Arithmetic, 91; Geography, 70; History, 17; Book-keeping, 14. At the close of the term which has just ended, seventy-five of the Students were boarders in the Academy.

The educational charge of the Institution still continues under the management of the Reverend HUMPHREY PICKARD, as Principal, with Mr. Joseph R. Hea, as Classical and French Tutor; Thomas W. Wood, Esq. English Master, and Mr. George Milligan and Mr. John T. Outhouse, assistant teachers. The patronage bestowed upon the Academy shews the estimation in which their labours are held in various parts of these Provinces, and says much for their zeal and ability, as well for the manner in which the other officers of the Institution discharge the duties with which they are entrusted.

The next term will begin on Thursday the 6th of January. The charges for tuition, board &c., in no case exceed £30 per annum.—*St. John Courier. December 1847.*
