

MARKET REVIEW AND FORECAST

TORONTO, Jan. 21.—The tie-up in railway transportation has left the market in a quiet state. Very little grain is moving, and the number of live stock on the market are small.

Orders are plentiful, but cannot be filled. Port William, nominal (including 3% tax); No. 1 northern, \$2.25; No. 2 northern, \$2.00; No. 3 northern, \$2.17; No. 4 wheat, \$2.10.

WHEAT.

There is very little movement in the wheat market. Wholesalers are tied up in the storm, and flour mills are reported at a standstill awaiting shipments of wheat.

Orders are plentiful, but cannot be filled. Port William, nominal (including 3% tax); No. 1 northern, \$2.25; No. 2 northern, \$2.00; No. 3 northern, \$2.17; No. 4 wheat, \$2.10.

COARSE GRAINS.

The same can be said of the coarse grain market as of wheat. Nothing is moving, and until the roads are better there will be very little sale. Prices are high and in some grains going higher.

MILL FEEDS.

There is a good demand for mill feeds, but supplies are scarce. Toronto quotations, corn lots, delivered, Montreal freights, shorts, \$40; bran, \$35; middlings, \$40; ground feed, \$40; flour per bag, \$3.25.

HAY AND STRAW.

Prices for hay remain unchanged with very little movement. Toronto and Montreal, No. 1, \$15.50 to \$16.50; mixed, \$13 to \$15; straw, car lots, \$5.50 to \$3. Montreal, No. 2 hay, per ton, lot, \$14.50 to \$16.

SEEDS.

Wholesalers are showing the following prices for seed at country points: Aleske, No. 1 fancy, bush, \$13.50 to \$12.50; No. 1, ordinary, \$11.50 to \$11.00; No. 2, per bushel, \$9.00 to \$11.00; No. 3, per bushel, \$8.00 to \$9.00; do rejected, per bushel, 4.20 to 7.00.

EGGS AND POULTRY.

The egg market is very firm at good prices. Fresh receipts are low, and birds are quoted in cartons at 55c to 70c.

DAIRY PRODUCTS.
