**Elsie Janis, American Ac-  
tress, Does Her Bit to  
Encourage Army**

With the American Army in  
France, June 11.—Seldom has a  
theatrical entertainment been staged  
in a more unusual setting than one  
given Thursday afternoon in a loca-  
tion which enabled several hundred  
hot and dirty American troops just  
out of the trenches to get back for  
an hour or so to the atmosphere of

Broadway. An open-air prize ring  
was the stage. Airplanes purred  
overhead and the booming of the  
guns on the front was plainly heard.  
The ring, located at a crossroad  
on a hill from which the German  
borderland opposite the Toul sector  
can easily be seen, is constructed of  
rough lumber and roped in as all
