

Word was received in the city yesterday that Lt. Col. M. A. Colquhoun, now brigadier commander at a Canadian camp in England, has been made a Companion of St. Michael and St. George. Lt. Col. Colquhoun's career since the outbreak of the war has been one of signal service, and has won fitting recognition. Col. Colquhoun took his departure from the city with the rank of captain, commanding the first active service quota from the Dufferin Rifles in August, 114. Within a year he rose to the rank of Major, and was appointed and officer commanding the 4th battalion, and six months later was awarded the D.S.O. for distinguished service. He has now been honored once more by the bestowal of the C.M.G., and every Brantfordite will feel pride in the recognition which has come to a fellow citizen.

DANCED AS SHELLS BURST OVERHEAD

Elsie Janes, American Actress, Does Her Bit to Encourage Army

With the American Army in France, June 11.—Seldom has a theatrical entertainment been staged in a more unusual setting than one given Thursday afternoon in a location which enabled several hundred hot and dirty American troopers just out of the trenches to get back for an hour or so to the atmosphere of Broadway. An open-air prize ring was the stage. Airplanes purred overhead and the booming of the guns on the front was plainly heard.

The ring, located at a crossroad on a hill from which the German borderland opposite the Post sector can easily be seen is constructed of rough lumber and roped in as all prize rings are. On it of an evening some of the energetic youngsters of the American army while away the hours of rest between trench hours by putting on the gloves and knocking each other around.

Elsie Janes appears.

The performer who trod the boards of this unique stage was Miss

Elsie Janes, now on a visit to the front to entertain the fighters. She told stories, sang new songs and danced and appeared unconcerned over the unusual conditions surrounding the performance, until a German airplane came over and so very far away. When the American anti-aircraft guns began bursting around the Boche plane, the performance stopped for a moment.

Miss Janes looked up and asked if there was any chance of her being killed, because she didn't want to be the first to do next day.

The doughboys, thick on the ground of the stage, on the house-tops, everywhere within hearing and

seeing distance, yelled in chorus, "No, keep on." Cheers and applause and shouting could be heard a mile away.

At the conclusion, Miss Janes offered to show the men the new dance steps and several accepted, including one "milk-skinner," who was a show all by himself.

The music for the performance was furnished by a Y.M.C.A. secretary on the remnant of an old piano.
