INSPECTOR JOHN GRANT

Talks of the Various District Creeks

Sulphur Will Yield More Largely Than Ever Before—Bear Looks Good.

John Grant, inspector of mines, who has recently returned from the creeks, said last night:

"I was on Sulphur last week and found that the miners there were generally better pleased with the results of their work than they have been for years. They now look upon Sulphur as a creek to be in no way despised, and there is a considerable amount of virgin ground on it yet to be worked.

"Returning down Bonanza and Eldorado I found everything looking satisfactory; dumps nearly cleaned up and a great deal of work being done in the way of open cuts and summer work.

"On the white channel of Eldorado the most important dumps are yet to be washed up, and a good deal of improvement work will be carried on there during the summer.

"I was on Bear creek two or three days ago and found the dumps pretty nearly washed up and a few hoisting from underground workings and washing. As a rule the people on Bear have found the creek up to expectations, the most striking operations and results to bear out this impression being carried on on No. 19 upper discovery by Mr. Field. He has there a claim which I consider most valuable, and one which goes to show what possibilities there are along the whole Klondike valley.

"Taking the camp as a whole perhaps as great possibilities are presented by it now as at any time, and it is not really worked out. To even suggest that the camp is worked out is puppyish. There is lots of ground yet to be opened up, and with every promise of splendid results. At least that is my opinion after having travelled and carefully investigated all the noted creeks of the country."

SUSPECT NUMBER ONE

Has Developed Something at Dog Island

Gulick Paulson Has Either Smallpox or Fever—Is Isolated.

Dr. MacArthur last night received a report from Dr. Edwards, medical officer at the quarantine station, that the passenger who shared the stateroom of the smallpox patient had shown symptoms of sickness, that his temperature had run up to 102 and that he had been isolated. Whether it is a case of smallpox or not remains for further developments.

The patient was on the steamer at the time his condition was discovered, but Dr. MacArthur says that many of the quarantined passengers have now "taken a tumble to themselves" and have been glad to leave the steamer for the tents provided by the government; they having discovered that the danger of infection is much more lessened in an isolated tent than in the narrow confines of a steamer.

One of the quarantined passengers writing to a friend in town yesterday probably before the "suspect" was discovered, makes this statement: "We have not seen a single smallpox germ since Casey Moran hove in sight."

The smallpox patient at the pest house on Bonanza is reported to be progressing favorably.

Gulick Paulson is the name of the late suspect and he was at once taken from the boat and placed in a tent on an isolated corner of the island, where his case is being closely watched by the attending physician, Dr. Edwards, who up to this afternoon was not prepared to say whether or not it is a case of smallpox. Paulson is said to have a high fever.

POLICE COURT.
