Why There are No Blue Roses.

The Straw Hat Business.

The traveling salesman for the whole hat business starts out with straw hats for the first season here. The last of the straw hats worn hereabouts have been put aside; the first to go start about the last of September. The straw hat season in the South opens on March 1; at some extreme points earlier. Wholesale deliveries in the South begin in January, and they are mostly completed by the middle of February. The active season in straw hat manufacturing runs from September to about the middle of April.—New York Sun.

Potatoes for Stock.

Exhaustive experiments are reported by the French Society of Agriculture in which a ration composed chiefly of potatoes afforded rapid gains in live weights of both sheep and cattle, a large percentage in dressed weight of the slaughtered animals, and flesh of excellent quality. Cooked potatoes proved more effective and profitable than uncooked.

Township Councils.

Camden Council.

Council met on Monday, July 7th, 1902, as a court of revision on Butler Young drain and on the Hawkins-Mason drain and for general business.

The court on the Butler-Young drain made the following changes in the assessment:

Report of engineer on repair of Greenwood drain was read and adopted and clerk instructed to prepare bylaw.

The petition of Fred Conliffe and others asking for a free ferry at Kings, on Sydenham river, of sufficient capacity to carry school children, was not entertained but reeve and comm'r. Hughton were appointed a committee to arrange for a suitable ferry for carrying school children.

Council adjourned to meet again on Monday, August 4th, for general business.

Meeting of Council.

The regular monthly meeting of the township council of the township of Chatham, held in the Township hall on Monday the 7th day of July pursuant to adjournment. The members were all present and the minutes of the last meeting were read and adopted.

A letter was read from Mr. James Langstaff stating that he will accept the sum of \$100.00 in damages sustained to lot 1 on the 13th concession by the dredging of the Chatham and Dover town line drain.

A letter was read from Edward Overstreet asking to have his statute labor commuted for two years.

A notice was received from Richard Sellers to have the Miss Drain extension repaired and improved.

A report was read from E. B. Jones superintendent city water works stating the amount of material required and an estimate of the cost of the same and the labor required for extending the city water works into Taylor avenue the total cost amounting to \$1245.14.

A statement was received from the county clerk to the effect that the sum of \$221.51 is due from the township for the maintenance of paupers for the year ending May 31st, 1902, also that the amount of the county rate to be raised is \$4575.64.

Edwin Bolton presented a petition for the construction of a new drain along the 6 and 7th concession road east from the Danforth drain.

Mr. George Hoyle addressed the council complaining that the commissioner of the best drain had extended the said drain into lot 21 in the 7th thereby flooding lot 20 of which Mr. Hoyle is tenant.

Samuel Craven made a complaint that there are bars in the Headley drain which causes the water to flood his land. On motion of Mr. Templeton and Mr. Wickens the matter was referred to Mr. Tompkins and the commissioner on the drain with power.

Moved by Mr. Templeton and Mr. Wickens that the petition presented by Mr. Ed. Bolton for a new drain along the 6th and 7th concession road be entertained and if the clerk find a majority of the names of the assessed owners in the area described to be on the said petition, to notify Mr. McGeorge, C. E., to make an examination and survey of the site of the proposed drain and the locality in connection therewith and report thereon as soon as possible as prayed for in said petition.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. George and Mr. Templeton that the account of J. R. Guttridge for disinfecting houses infected with small pox, and the account of Dr. Charteris, medical health officer, in connection with the same matter, be referred to Mr. Tompkins to settle.—Carried.

The by-law to be submitted to the ratepayers qualified to vote on the same for confirming the borrowing of \$5,500.00 being the township's portion of constructing a bridge over the Sydenham river at Tupperville, received the 1st and 2nd reading. On motion of Mr. Wickens and Mr. Templeton the same was provisionally adopted. The vote to be taken at the different polling divisions on the first day of August, 1902, as the statutes direct.

A number of accounts were passed.
