### TIMBER SENT TO CHATHAM

The Drader Mills Purchase a Majority of the Timber From the Recently Burned 'Burg Mills.

It has been currently reported that W. N. Drader had purchased all the logs belonging to Steinhoff & Gordon at Wallaceburg, and that the latter would not rebuild their mill. Mr. Drader was seen by The Planet

this morning, and, being asked about the report, said: "Yes, I believe that Steinhoff & Gordon have decided not to rebuild. If they do build again it will only be a small mill. You see the saw mill industry as far as Kent county is concerned is about at an end. The trees are pretty nearly all done, and the Wallaceburg lumber firm have decided that it would not repay them to rebuild their mill, which was the largest in Western Ontario. They have offered me the logs they had purchased for their season's work, some four million feet, and also their bolts. I have three million feet of my own logs, so I was unable to handle the whole lot, but I will take all their hoop logs, which will be about a million feet. The remainder will be taken to the Unit-ed States. I have purchased all of Steinhoff & Gordon's bolts, amounting to 600 cords, and I will have to double my hoop department. This will necessitate additional machinery, and we will be running night and day all sum-

Few realize the magnitude of the Drader stave mills, which have within the past year taken a prominent place among Chatham's factories. A slight idea of the timber handled is obtained when one ponders on the fact that th emill will manufacture four million feet of lumber this year.
