REFURMERS OPPOSING ROSS

Some of the hardest knocks the Ross system is getting are coming from Reformers. It was a heavy blow that Mr. Walter Mills, son of the late Hon. David Mills, gave the other day at Ridgetown. Life-long Reformer though he is, Mr. Mills declared he was proud to support the Conservative candidate and to help "clean out the men who had tarnished the good same of Ontario by corruption." Need we wonder that the clergy, as the guardians of public morality, feel compelled to speak out against the Government? The declaration of Rev. J. E. Hanter that it is the duty or all good men to help get rid of the barnacles voices widespread public opinion. At the same meeting as Mr. Hunter addressed, a letter was read from another clergyman, Rev. Edward Softley, of Ridgetown, stating that it was his duty to condemn "the brazen dishon. esty and perjury which the courts have proven to be associated with the party in power." Clearly the province is in revolt against Mr. Ross and his ways. We have another indication of the way public opinion is pointing in the fact that in West Northumberland Mr. Field, the Conservative candidate, is the son of a Liberal who represented the riding for twelve years in the Legislature. It is the Liberals of a few years ago who are to-day the hottest after the scalp of Mr. Ross. If the Government could be helped by a certificate of character it could not get it from his candid friends.—Mail and Empire.

WILL THE GLOBE WITHDRAW?

Under the heading "Disliked by His Party," The Mail in a recent issue gave its readers to understand that not only had Ald. McCoig, of Chatham refused the Liberal nomination for West Kent, but had, moreover, violently denounced the Ross government, declared that it was corrupt and rotten, and that he would not be the party candidate. The fact is that Mr. McCoig was unanimously selected by the largest and most influential convention of Liberals ever gathered in West Kent; that he accepted the nomination, and made an able speech in support of the Liberal administration. The Chatham Planet published the stuff to which The Mail is now giving currency, although Ald. McCoig immediately on its appearance denounced it as absolutely and utterly false. The Mail is evidently determined to conduct the Provincial campaign on the sume mendacious and slanderous lines that characterized its columns in the Dominion contest.—Toronto Globe.

Such statements as the Globe makes do not, of course, need to be met in West Kent, where the facts are well known. But the Globe's effort is doubtless directed towards neutralizing the general sentiment which the publicity of Ald. McCoig's expressed opinion of the Ross Government and its corrupt associates may have throughout the Province. And it does seem strange that a presumably reputable Canadian journal—even though it be as blindly rartizan as the Globe row is—would stoor to the publication of statements which it must know are utterly untrue. The Globe to-day is no longer the Globe of the sturdy, honest, straightforward, Hon. George Brown, and Mr. J. S. Willison days. The facts are these, and lest the Globe may twist or turn them, we will seek to jut them plainly.

Prior to the convention which nominated him-lis nomination being "insisted upon" by Premier Ross, as Mr. Pardo, M. P.P., then publicly stated-Ald. McCoig openly and freely said in the presence of several, and upon different occasions:-

"I THINK THE ROSS GOVERNMENT IS A GONER. THEY'VE BEEN THERE ALTOGETHER TOO LONG AND THEY'VE GOT TOO MANY HEELERS AND HANGERS ON."

"THE WHOLE THING IS CORRUPT AND ROTTEN, AND I BE-LIEVE THEY SHOULD BE TURNED OUT."

"NO; I TELL YOU SOLEMNLY AND HONESTLY, I WOULDN'T BE THEIR CANDIDATE IF I COULD."

For the further information of the Globe we may state that this statement has appeared every day upon the front page of The Planet, and, so far as this journal is aware, ALD. McCOIG HAS NEVER DENIED THE MAKING OF IT, EITHER VERBALLY OR OVER HIS SIGNATURE. Had it been an untruth, as the Globe alleges, we feel assured Ald. McCoig would have made an affidavit to that effect and have promptly stopped the publication of it.

ALD. McCOIG MADE THE STATEMENT HONESTLY AND CON-SCIENTIOUSLY, we doubt not. HE BELIEVED WHAT HE THEN SAID, and that the "insistance" of Mr. Ross and his camp followers was the means of putting him in his present unfortunate position, we feel assured he regrets as much as do his friends.

The Planet would impress upon the Globe the fact that it does not publish "stuff" that is "utterly false." This journal hopes to always maintain a course that is worthy, truthful 'and clean, no matter how strenuous the campaign may become. The Globe may not understand such a position now, but in the old days, it gained the admiration of political friends and opponents for adopting this same creditable course. And we hope it is not yet too late for reformation.
