MURDERER IS MINISTER'S SON

Father of Slaughter, the Essex Murderer, is Bearing up Well

Began His Pastorate Sunday of Colored Church in Amherstburg-Messages from the Murderer

Amherstburg, Ont., Oct. 10.-Labor ing under a grief which almost unnerved n.m. Rev. David S. Slaughter preached his first sermon as pastor of the First Baptist church here, and he could not refrain from referring to his own sorrow.

Only a few hours before Rev Slaughter ascended the pulpit he had heard his son, Edward Slaughter, sen-tenced to be "hanged by the neck until dead.'

Rev. Slaughter's eyes were dimmed Mev. Staughter a symbol with the tears which have been falling almost constantly since he heard the words which, unless sentence is commuted, means his son must die commuted, means his son must die almost on the eve of Christmas. Even now the death watch paces the cell in the Sandwich jail eyeing every move-ment of the young man who probably will be permitted to leave the prison walls only to wend his way to the scaffold.

"Dear brethren," spoke the old min-ster, his voice quivering with emo-tion, "the Lord's providence seems strange to me to-day. But God doesn't at all times explain what he does. At some future day we will under-stand why, just at this time, I am sent to minister to you.

MOTHER PROSTRATED.

The service over, the members of the congregation, deeply affected by the words of their pastor, walked for-ward, shook his hand and tried to speak words of consolation. In a

speak words of consolation. In a neighbor's home, not far from the church, lay Mrs. Slaughter, prostrated by the shock of her son's fate. "God knows best," she whispered. "If it hadn't been for the circumstances surrounding our boy, we would never have been called here to tell God's truth and cause his chilten to believe in Him. If we were far away nerhans they would not far away nerhans they would not far away, perhaps, they would not treat my dear boy even as well as they are doing now. It has been the means of our boy's conversion, and I believe God will save his life."

Rev. Slaughter is a light-complex-ioned colored man, of sturdy build and pleasant appearance, 57 years old. Born in Danville, Boyle County, Ky., as a young man he went to the front as a woung man newest to the front as a member of the One Hundred and Fourteen United States colored in-fantry, serving his country nearly three years and receiving an honor-able discharge. Naturally of a deeply able discharge. Naturally of a deeply religious nature, Mr. Slaughter early chose the ministry as his life work, and June 24, 1877, in his home town, he was ordained. Edward was the black sheep of the family of six boys and two girls.

NOT A BAD BOY.

"I am the last person in the world to complain of my calling," Rev. Staughter observed in a talk with a reporter, "but don't you know it is a difficult task for a minister, who must travel from one church to an-other, to give his children the educa-tion and attention they require?

"Eddie was never a bad boy. Some-times he was mischievous, but not un-like most boys. He was quiet and hard to be aroused. I tried to do all I could for him, and he attended the public schools, receiving an ordinary education. I am a plasterer by trade and I have done odd jobs, Eddie working with me.

"It is often said preachers' children

are the worst. I do not believe that. Teach the child the way he should go while he is young and when he is old he will not depart therefrom, is a quotation over which I have pondered so much since Eddie 20t into this trouble. Writers have substituted 'may' for 'will' and this affords me, as a minister, the consolation that I have probably done my luty toward my son, Eddie.

ACCIDENTAL BLOW. "I do not believe my boy ever struck that man with murderous in-tent; I believe it was an accidental blow struck when Eddie was in fear. In the United States he would have been charged with manslaughter and not murder. Yet I have no fault to find with the court or the crown pro-secutor, My son's attorney, D. R.

"Father," he said to his parent, af-

ter the sentence, "I never meant to kill that man. I am no murderer and never consider me as such, no matter what comes of me.'

MESSAGE FROM MURDERER. From the prison Slaughter has written a number of letters to his father in which he speaks of his conrersion. Here are some extracts:—
I am in the best of spirits and am not in the least worried about any-thing. I have plenty of good reading and of the kind I like best. Just as I and of the kind I like best. Just as I used to like other books and shun the Bible and its kind, I now love the Bible and shun the others. No other book can interest me unless it is in a way to learn me more about Jesus. Just as I used to long for the world and the things in the world now I long to forget and to do something that will help some one else to know and see as I do.
