London, Nov. 3.—(C. A. P.)—Tho-mas Richardson, labor candidate, de-feated Sir John Alexander Cock-burn, who stood as a tarif reformer, in the bye-election for West Monmouthshire, by a majority of 4,635 votes. The vacancy was caused by the death of Sir William Harcourt, whose majority in 1900 was 3,575. Though Sir John Cockburn had radi-Though Sir John Cockburn had radical tendencies, his candidature, was endorsed in a letter from Mr. Chamberlain. Sir John Cockburn was Premier and Chief Secretary of South Australia in 1889-90, and after holding various other offices, was appointed Agent-General for that colony in 1901.
