### SLOUCHED HATS.

They Once Caused a Riot With Great Loss of Life in Spain.

Has not some one calculated that a sixth part of the population of St. Simon in the original is occupied with the controversy whether or not the president of parliament should wear his hat or put it on the desk when performing various functions? At length the matter was compromised. The Tiers-etat should wear a chapeau brim battu, which had the slouched brim pinned up. This childish quarrel was remembered, no doubt, when the states general met and the king harangued them. His speech over, he put on his cording and the privilege of the commons had no such claim, but they also clapped on their chapeaux rabattus, amid fierce protests from the nobles. The revolution might have begun that day with a scrimmage in the king's presence had he not removed his own hat, when all, of course, did the same.

But slouched hats had already caused a riot in Spain, which lasted so long and cost so many lives that it might almost be termed a civil war. This was twenty years earlier. Charles III. thought them untidy. He thought the streets of his capital untidy also and denounced both eyesores in an edict. Every Spaniard henceforth must pin up his flowing brim, and every householder of Madrid must clean the street, sweep his premises. Forthwith the people rose. They were little interested comparatively in the street cleaning, but they would die for their hats. And a good many of them, who were not slouched hat men, thought the slouched hat was a thing to be thought remarkably for foreign observers that at 2 p. m. regularly the soldiers plied arms, the furious citizens withdrew and silence reigned for one hour. Both parties were enjoying the siesta except perhaps the wounded. After that interval they recommenced. The King fled, and for the rest of his life he never returned to Madrid willingly. In fact, it was understood he designed to make Seville the capital henceforth and only gave up the project when his ministers showed him what a vast sum he had already spent on the new palace. So mightily was the influence of the hat in state affairs.

Finally the King compromised. He withdrew his edict so far as the regulation of the streets was concerned. Within the walls of Madrid every man must wear his brim pinned up, but outside he was at liberty to let it slouch. But the police courts did not cease to be busy until the fashion changed.—St. James' Gazette.

### Not His Style.

A Welsh judge had before him a case in which a printer sued a pork butcher for the value of a large parcel of paper bags with the butcher's advertisement printed thereon. The printer, who was no suitable illustration to embellish the work, thought he improved the occasion by putting an elaborate royal arms above the man's name and address, but ultimately the latter refused to pay. The judge, looking over his shoulder, observed that for his part he thought the lion and the unicorn were much nicer than an old fat pig. ### Largest Loaves in the World.

The largest loaves of bread baked in the world are those of France and Italy. The "pipe" bread of Italy is baked in loaves two or three feet long, while in France the loaves are made in the shape of very long rolls four or five feet in length and in many cases even six feet. The bread of Paris is distributed almost exclusively by women, who go to the various bakeries at 5.30 a. m. and spend about an hour polishing up the loaves. After the loaves are thoroughly cleaned of dust and grit the "bread porter" proceeds on the round of her customers. Those who live in apartments or flats find their loaves leaning against the door.

### Insects and Cold.

Insects which spend the major portion of their lives in a torpid or semi-torpid state are but seldom injured and never killed by being frozen. Instances are numerous of travelers in mountain regions finding beetles or butterflies above the snow line which were frozen stiff and apparently stone dead. However, when these same insects were carried down into the warmer atmosphere of the valleys or into a mountaineer's cabin they completely revived in a very short while. It appears that their normal vital powers are so low that a degree of cold that would prove fatal to a more highly organized creature seldom hurts them.

### Dominion to Control.

Ottawa, May 9.—In the railway committee yesterday morning, Hon. Mr. Emmerson stated that at the coming conference of the premiers on Dominion Government, an amendment to the B. N. A. Act will be submitted having for its object the vesting of jurisdiction of all railways in the Dominion Government.

Nevertheless the committee did not grant a Dominion charter to the Hamilton, Waterloo and Guelph Railway. The bill was opposed by R. G. Code, representing the Provincial Government. Claude Macdonell (South Toronto), W. F. Cockshutt (Bramford), and Mr. Gervais (Montreal), also opposed a further invasion of provincial jurisdiction.
