WRECK AT WOODSTOCK

Train Running At Rate Of 50 Miles An Hour Derailed

G. T. R. EXPRESS DITCHED

Woodstock, Nov. 17.—With three-quarters of an hour lost time to make up, the Chicago-New York express on the Grand Trunk, howling along at 50 miles or more an hour, was derailed about one and one-quarter miles west of Woodstock at 4.45 o'clock yesterday morning.

The locomotive did not leave the tracks, but the coaches did. A day coach and a Pullman went over the embankment into the ditch, and the former turned over, yet not a single fatality has to be recorded, not even a very serious injury. The escape of the passengers, when the possibilities of the wreck are realized, borders on the miraculous.

The derailment occurred just west of the C.P.R. diamond. The cause is not yet ascertained.

Edward Wilkinson of Toronto, brakeman, back injured.
Frank McCormick of Toronto, conductor, bruises and shock.
Charles Hicks of Buffalo, knee injured.
Mrs. Hicks, three ribs broken.
J. R. Smith of Rochester, scalp wounds.
Mrs. Smith, hip injured.
Edwin Skinner, Lapeer, Mich., head cut.
Peter Jorgenson, Memphis, Neb., left hand badly lacerated.
All the injured were in the day coach, when the accident happened.

GIRL SMOTHERED BY GAS.

Parents May Not Live—Two Sons Were Dazed.

Deseronto, Nov. 17.—Gas escaping during the night was the cause of death by suffocation of the only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Wright of this town.

The family, consisting of Mr. and Mrs. Wright, two sons and one daughter, aged about 21, retired as usual Thursday night, the two sons sleeping in the upper flat. Yesterday morning the boys were around the house but appeared to be dazed through inhaling the gas, and it was 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon before they recovered sufficiently to realize the condition of the rest of the family.

A doctor was immediately summoned, but when he arrived he found the daughter had been dead for some time; the father and mother are now in a very serious condition, with but slight hopes of their recovery. An inquest will be held.

Crushed in Brick Machine.

Brantford, Nov. 17.—Edward Gains, colored, was killed yesterday afternoon instantly while working on a brick pressing machine in the Brantford Brick Co.'s yards. The man climbed up the machine in order to see how many forms there were still to be pressed, and fell, his head being crushed between a lever and a support on the machine. No one saw the man fall. He was found very shortly afterwards and was dead.

Fatal Fall on Stairs.

Quebec, Nov. 17.—Henry Morgan, merchant tailor, Monday evening at the St. Louis Hotel, had mounted the sixth step of the stairs when he lost his balance and fell backwards. He died at midnight from concussion of the brain.

Fatally Hurt in Hunt.

Ingersoll, Nov. 17.—Word was received here yesterday that Henry Herron of Ayr, a short distance from here, who was injured while hunting deer near Burks Falls, was not likely to recover. Mr. Herron belonged to the Black Creek Hunting Club, of which several Ingersoll men are members.

Chas. McIlroy's Jump to Death.

Toronto, Nov. 17.—Despondent over the death of his wife, Charles McIlroy, aged 35, and employed by the Canada Foundry Co., jumped off the C.P.R. bridge in Rosedale, near the Reservoir, early yesterday afternoon. The drop would be about 50 or 60 feet and death must have been instantaneous. He leaves four young children.

On False Pretences.

London, Nov. 17.—In consequence of the recent action of certain agents in inducing workmen to emigrate to Canada under false representation that work was awaiting them there, whereas they were really wanted to take the places of strikers, the president of the board of trade, Mr. Lloyd George, in the House of Commons yesterday secured the adoption of a new clause for the merchants' shipping bill, providing that anyone inducing emigrants by false representations is liable to a fine of \$250 or imprisonment at hard labor for three months for each offence.

Furniture Men Not Guilty.

Toronto, Nov. 17.—With the statement that a criminal combination had not been shown to exist, Justice Teitel in the assize court yesterday dismissed the charge of conspiracy to defraud the city, on which four firms of furniture dealers were being prosecuted. These firms were: The Chas. Rogers & Sons, Limited; the Office Specialty Co., the Canadian Office & School Furniture Co., and G. N. Reynolds & Co. There were only two witnesses heard—Manager Wildman of the Office Specialty Co. and W. B. Rogers.

Wages Paid By U. S. Concern.

Belleville, Nov. 17.—The alien labor law case, in which the Corby Distillery Co. is concerned, was continued yesterday afternoon. All the alien copper-smiths were examined, and all testified that they were sent here from Cincinnati and received their pay from the Ansonia Copper Co. of that city. The magistrate adjourned the case for a week.

A GREAT DEARTH IN MALE STENOGRAPHERS.

To the Editor of The Planet:

Dear Sir:—We have taken up your valuable space a number of times in the hope of inducing more young men to take up stenographic work. Five excellent calls of this kind within the last few days prompts me to bring the matter once more before your readers.

It is only a few days since one of the few young men who are taking training in the shorthand department was offered \$70 per month to commence with, and with a good chance of the position being worth \$100 within a few months. We have two more calls to-day of this kind, one from a large concern in Toronto asking us if we can help them out and get them a good male stenographer about 18 years of age. We have another from Detroit offering \$50 per month to start with if we could send them a good male stenographer on Saturday. Two other calls came in from Detroit yesterday, one for a position Jan. 1st and the other for a position to be filled Jan. 20th. In all of these positions it is male stenographers that are asked for.

Any good male stenographer can to-day command \$80 to \$100 per month to commence with, and I know of no line that offers such grand opportunities for advancement to those who have the business training to back it up, as does work in the line of shorthand.

We hope that bringing this matter before the readers of your valuable paper may put some of the Chatham young men in the notion of preparing themselves to take some such positions as those we have mentioned. This dearth of male stenographers has been increasing for the last five or six years, and every year getting worse.
