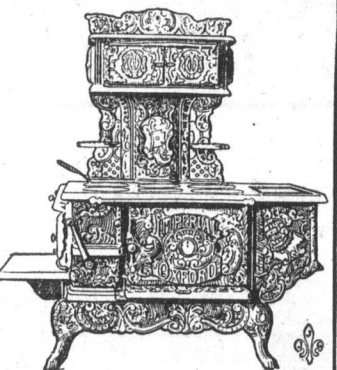

BURBANK'S THEORY.
Explains Application of Plant Culture Ideas to Rearing Children.—No Maudlin Sentiment.

At a dinner given recently by the California state board of trade to Luther Burbank, the horticulturist, he delivered a speech which is noteworthy as containing a flat contradiction of the theories of the evolutionists that heredity plays a more important part in the development of character than environment. Among the important things which he said he had learned to study and know by the study of plant life were these:

"There is no doubt that if a child with a vicious temper be placed in an environment of peace and quiet the temper will change. Put a boy of gentle white parents among Indians and he will grow up like an Indian. Let a child born of criminal parents have a setting of morality and decency, and the chances are that he will not grow into a criminal but to an upright man."

"I do not say heredity will not sometimes assert itself. When the criminal instinct crops out in the individual it might appear as if environment were leveled to the ground, but in succeeding generations the effect of constant higher environment will not fail to become fixed."

"We in America form a nation with the blood of half the peoples of the world within our veins. We are more crossed than any other nation in the history of the world, and here we meet the same results that are always seen in a much crossed race of plants. All the worst as well as all the best qualities of each are brought out in their fullest intensities, and right here is where selective environment counts."

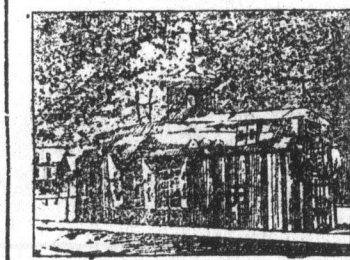
"As time goes on environment will crystallize the American nation. Its varying elements will become unified and the weeding out process will probably leave the finest human product ever known."

"What will hasten this development of most of all? The proper rearing of children. Don't feed children on mendacious sentimentalism or dogmatic religion; give them nature. Let their soul drink in all that is pure and sweet. Don't terrify them in early life with fear of the after world. There never was a child that was made more noble and good by fear of Hell. Let nature teach them the lessons of good and proper living, combined with an abundance of well balanced nourishment. Those children will grow to be the best men and women."

CATHEDRAL MADE OF JUNK.

Greek Orthodox Structure Built by Archbishop Serafim At Winnipeg.

The peculiar structure shown in the picture is the cathedral of Archbishop Serafim at Winnipeg. That prelate built it with his own hands, unaided by any workman of any kind. Realizing that an archbishop without a cathedral was like a ship without a rudder, Serafim collected a mass of junk

of all sorts and proceeded to fashion one of the most wonderfully constructed buildings ever seen in any civilized country. The sides and ends are of flotsam timber, and it is put together with scrap iron. The roof is of tin most laboriously patched together. There is even a chime of rusty bells over the door, and there is some attempt at ornamentation. The irreverent and mischievous boys of Winnipeg have pulled it down once or twice, but the good Serafim has restored it.

Serafim's flock is scattered and very poor, consisting for the most part of Russian peasants who have settled in the Northwest and a few Orthodox families that have come down from the north.

Pinching a Pickpocket.

It happened on a race course in Russia. Among the spectators was a tall, powerfully built man, no longer young, and he was leaning back against a railing when he suddenly felt a hand slipped into his pocket in search, no doubt, of a silver snuffbox which he habitually carried. He said not a word, but raising himself on tiptoe for a moment he sat down on top of the rail and on top of the hand in his pocket. The thief struggled in vain to release himself, while his captor showed no sign of knowing that there was anything amiss until at length the pain became too great for endurance, and the pickpocket called out in agony. Then the old gentleman got up and said as the wretched man behind him drew out a hand blue and swollen, "Another time you will keep your fingers from other people's pockets."

Frankfurter.

The little sausage known as "Frankfurter" and "Wiener" was, according to the Wiener Neu Freie Presse, offered for sale for the first time in 1808, and the centennial was observed in Vienna by the Butchers' Guild. The inventor of the sausage was Johann Lahner, who named it for his birthplace, Frankfurt. The business founded one hundred years ago by a poor man has yielded a fortune to its various heirs. It has always remained in the same family, and is now conducted in Vienna by Franz Lahner, a grand-nephew of the original Frankfurter sausage man.
