AN IMPERIAL COUNCIL

Lyttelton Takes Step Towards a United Empire.

Suggests Colonial Conference Be Entitled as Above, But Canada Makes the Counter-Suggestion of "Imperial Conference"—Colonial Governments Agree, But the Dominion Has Objections to the Scheme.

London, Dec. 2.—(C.A.P.)—The following correspondence relating to the future organization of the colonial conference has just been issued. On Nov. 29, the Lyttelton conference discussed the following important telegram to the Governor of each of the self-governing colonies: "I request that you will inform your Ministers as follows:

"It was assumed when I sent my despatch of April 20 last, that, in accordance with the resolution passed at the colonial conference of 1902, it would be in the normal course of events to proper to issue an invitation to the next conference for the summer of 1906.

"It appears, however, as the result of the correspondence following upon the above-mentioned despatch, that it would not be possible for the Prime Ministers of Australia and New Zealand to attend a conference held later than the spring of 1906. It appears doubtful whether it would be practicable to make sufficient preparation before the latter date of the subjects at a later date, but in the meantime should be glad to know whether, in the opinion of your Ministers, it would be advisable in these circumstances to take advantage of the latitude allowed by the terms of the resolution already referred to, and postpone the meeting of the conference until 1907.

"Mr. Lyttelton suggested to the Government of the self-governing colonies that the title 'Imperial Council' should be substituted for 'Colonial Conference,' and that a permanent commission of enquiry should be established to assist the council. Several of the Colonial Governments have signified their agreement with the suggestions of his Majesty's Government, but in a number of instances a complete answer has not yet been received."

Resting on Lyttelton's proposals, Canada cabled Thursday night and suggested that the conference should be styled "Imperial Council" instead of "Colonial Conference," and promised to give full consideration to the proposal to appoint a permanent commission at the same time, the expression of doubt as to its usefulness.

Newfoundland expressed an opinion that the present method of calling colonial conferences offered the best advantage over other schemes suggested. Natal, Cape Colony and Australia sent favorable replies, whilst New Zealand's answer is delayed owing to the elections.

Canada's objection to Mr. Lyttelton's scheme are "That an imperial council might eventually come to be regarded as an encroachment upon the full measure of autonomous legislative and administrative power now enjoyed by all Colonial Governments," and that a permanent commission "might conceivably interfere with the working of responsible Government."

TO BENEFIT UNEMPLOYED.

Queen Will Sell "The Queen's Christmas Card" Contributed By Notable Artists—Birthday Celebrated.

London, Dec. 2.—Queen Alexandra was 61 years old yesterday, and her birthday was celebrated with the usual heartiness throughout the kingdom, including artillery salutes, the ringing of church bells and the display of flags, etc. Congratulations from all parts poured in at Sandringham, where the Queen entertained all the children of the estate at tea, personally superintending the proceedings.

Queen Alexandra has not given up her interest in behalf of the unemployed, and has sanctioned a unique plan to raise more funds for them. This will be in the shape of the issue of a Christmas book, which will be entitled, "The Queen's Christmas Card." It will consist of poetry, sketches, drawings and music by persons prominent in the worlds of art and literature of Great Britain.

Algernon Charles Swinburne, Alfred Austin, the poet Laureate; Thomas Hardy, Marie Corelli, Hall Caine, Geo. Meredith, Arthur Conan Doyle, Sir Lawrence Alma-Tadema, Edwin A. Abbey, Wm. Holman Hunt, Sir Edward John Poynter and Sir Edward Elgar are among those who will contribute.

The production of the book will be practically gratuitous. It will sell for 6s. a crown, and the proceeds will be devoted to the Queen's unemployed fund.

Royal Salute at Toronto.

Toronto, Dec. 2.—A royal salute of twenty-one guns was fired by the Toronto Field Battery at the noon hour yesterday in front of the Parliament Buildings in honor of Her Majesty's birthday.

Five Rioters Killed.

Georgetown, Demarara, Dec. 2.—A strike of wharf laborers, which is in progress here, assumed a serious aspect yesterday morning when the police were compelled to fire on a riotous mob. Five of the rioters were killed. Later in the day the rioters attacked the Governor's house. The Governor and other officers are now besieged in the public buildings. The arrival of warships is anxiously awaited.

German Army Losses.

Berlin, Dec. 2.—The Militar Wochenblatt, the army organ, published yesterday morning the losses of German troops operating against the Transvaal in German Southwest Africa. The total number of men in the field is given as 16,000, and the total loss, including wounded, is 151 officers, 207 non-coms, and 1,334 privates.

Louber's Last Term.

Paris, Dec. 2.—In the course of an interview published yesterday M. Louber states categorically that he will not accept a re-election to the Presidency, as he considers a renewal of the Presidential mandate undesirable in a democratic country.
