It is a rare occurrence nowadays to find the ministry and especially the Catholic ministry opposed to trade unions and the legitimate efforts of the working class to obtain better working conditions. The recent denouncement of trade unions by the Archbishop of St. John's, Dr. M. F. Howley, comes, therefore, as a great surprise. Not only did he denounce trade unions but expressed the belief that the old days of the truck system when men were paid in goods instead of eash, were shetter days. Almost two-thirds of the members of the labor unions in Newfoundland belong to the Roman Catholic church, and the Archbishop's statement has caused widespread consternation and surprise. Everyone will concede that the Archbishop is justly entitled to his own convictions but a publie pronouncement in favor of the abominal Truck Act is to be deplored, and a return to those days would not only be a retograde movement, but would be social suicide.


