Gaspereau Church.

Last Sunday the Baptist church of Gaspereau, which has been undergoing repairs for the past seven or eight weeks, was re-opened for service. Since its closure it has been greatly improved both in appearance and convenience. The congregation have transformed their house of worship which formerly presented a comparatively bleak and unattractive appearance into a neat, beautiful and cozy village chapel. A gallery in the rear, which was previously occupied by the choir, has been removed, while to make room for the choir behind, the pulpit has been brought down nearer the door. The ceiling has been steepled and prettily stained which greatly adds to the beauty of the house. The walls are whitened with alabaster and the seats tastefully painted. A collar has been excavated and a superior furnace procured by which the church can be heated speedily in the coldest weather. The undertaking has been a considerable one, the expenses being about seven hundred dollars, but when the congregation look at the result of the expenditure they must feel that it has been well made.
