Acadia Academy Cadet Corps Inspection.

The Acadia Academy Cadet Corps completed the work of the year and passed inspection on the University Campus on May 21st. Major Ouliffe, the official inspector, was accompanied by Lieut. Col. N. H. Parsons, both being in official uniform.

The cadets gave some very creditable exhibitions of marching, arm drill, signalling, and skirmishing, in all of which they gave evidence of the careful training which they had received during the year from their instructors, Mr. C. W. Robinson and Mr. W. C. Lawson, of the Academy staff.

The arms and equipment were inspected and found to be in good condition. At the close of the inspection Messrs. Ouliffe and Parsons and Principal Archibald dined with the students, on which occasion in a number of short speeches, the students were complimented on the work of the day and were given some wholesome and profitable advice.

The total enrollment of cadets during the year was 115 and a goodly percentage of these made commendable progress in their training. It is probable that a number of boys of this cadet corps will attend the shooting competition at Bedford and the cadet camp at Aldershot in August next.

Much credit should be given to the company leaders, Messrs. George Cox, Charles Webster, Leslie Manning, Arthur Cook, Raymond Acker, and Harold Benjamin for the enthusiastic way in which they cooperated with their instructors during the year.

Tabernacle Society.

The eleventh annual meeting of the Tabernacle Society was held at the Tabernacle on Thursday evening, the 15th inst.

The report of the Executive Committee, Superintendent of the Sunday School and Treasurer showed that the work was in a healthy condition.

The Sunday evening services have been continued through the year and the Tuesday evening services during the winter months. During the absence of the students, the ministers residing in the town have conducted the Sunday evening services. After the opening of the College, Bro. H. E. Allaby, of the Senior class, kindly consented to take charge of the Sunday evening services, either speaking himself or securing a satisfactory supply. He also enlisted a number of others to aid in the singing so that the services have been made very interesting and have been well attended.

The Sunday School has held fifty-one sessions. It has an enrollment of fifty-nine. The largest attendance was forty, and the lowest nineteen. The average twenty-nine.

Mr. C. M. Haverstock has an interesting class of boys which he meets one evening each week as well as on Sunday. Miss Annie Fitch meets her class during the week and gives them instruction in sewing.

The school contributes toward the support of a child in India.

The Treasurer reported the Sunday evening collections \$54 23. Sunday School collections \$33 81. Donations \$97.20, making with balance from last report a total of \$107 04.

The expenditure, including interest, insurance, fuel, light, etc., \$113.52, leaving a balance of \$83 52.

Capt. J. B. Tingley was elected President, Prof. F. R. Haley, Vice-president; Rev. M. P. Freeman, Secretary; Messrs. John Caldwell, General Superintendent, A. Coburn, Treasurer, Chas. Patrique, Sunday School Superintendent; and Prof. Haycock re-elected Trustee.

Rev. C. H. Martel, Mrs. Geo. Fitch, Mrs. Kempton and Miss Richardson were appointed a Committee with power to add to their number to do personal work.

Among the forces at work for the moral improvement of our town, we believe the work at the Tabernacle occupies an important place and deserves the sympathy and support of all who desire this moral improvement.

The outlook for the Society was never better. Its property, worth between \$1500 and \$1800, is clear of debt except \$200.00 on the mortgage, which we hope to clear off during the year. New helpers are coming forward and the workers are looking and praying for the manifestation of saving power. A. COHORN.

Recent Deaths.

Wolffville people generally extend profound sympathy for Captain and Mrs. Samuel M. Beardsley in their recent bereavement—the death of their eldest son, Harold, which occurred on Sunday last, of appendicitis, following an operation performed by Dr. Westberry, of Halifax, on Saturday night. The deceased was fifteen years of age and a bright and sunny lad, just popular with his companions during his residence in Wolfville. He was a student of the middle year at Acadia Collegiate Academy last year and did excellent work, carrying off a number of prizes. His parents naturally had high expectations for him and his early death is a heavy blow. The funeral took place on Monday morning, the remains being taken by train to Port Louis, Annapolis county, his old home, for interment, accompanied by the heartfelt members of the family. Rev. Dr. Archibald conducted the service at the home, and spoke most feelingly of the lad who had been one of the brightest pupils at his school. There was a very large attendance, the boys of the Academy attending in a body and also the various patrols of Boy Scouts, of which the deceased was a leader.
