Knitting Contest.

The church is essentially the grand centre of all institutions—educative, religious, philanthropic and recreative. It has been suggested that the various churches in our town give a series of instructive entertainments during the coming months. To this end 'The Ladies Knitting Club' of St. Andrew's Presbyterian church are preparing for a most interesting event—a Knitting Contest to be given about the middle of October. Please observe and cut out the rules for contest given below. A good program is also being prepared with original numbers. Mrs. H. I. Gould has generously and patriotically offered her spacious home on Main Street for the occasion. We hope a goodly number of ladies will enter the contest, or come and bring way work. One-third of the proceeds will be contributed to Red Cross chapter.

Each contestant will procure two skeins yarn and steel needles No. 10, or corresponding size in bone. Wash yarn, wind, set up sock as follows: Fifty-six stitches. Cast three rounds—a purl and a plain. Continue plain. The contest will occupy 45 minutes. Two first prizes will be offered—one for the best knitting, the other for greatest number of rows knitted. If a tie, the judges decide by holding five minutes more. Be sure the knitting is accurate. The sock when finished must show 2 1/2 inches of ribbing. All finished pairs of socks must be returned to Red Cross Rooms or to L. O. D. S. where yarn for the contest may be procured.
