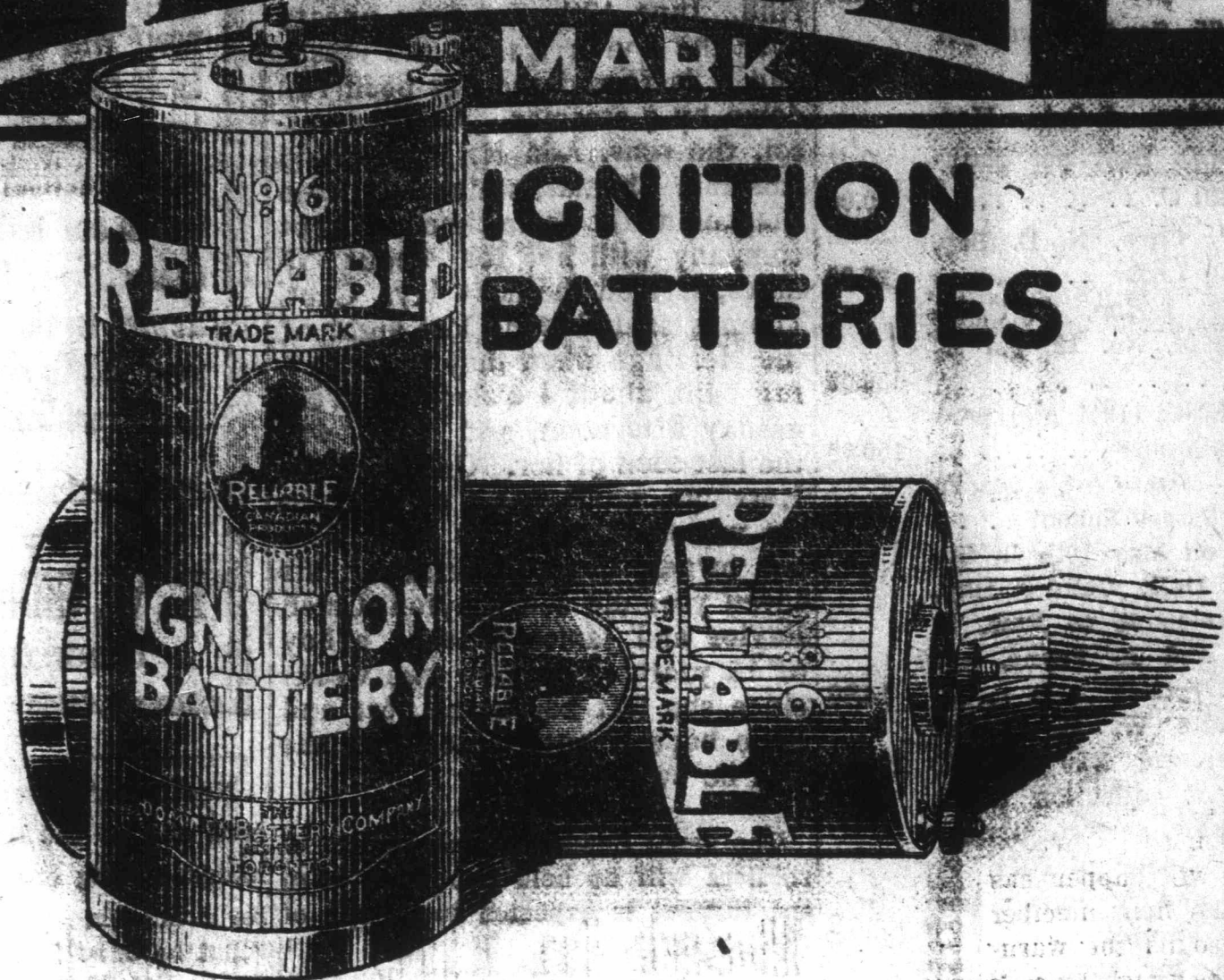

Benjamin Garland vs. Sims Lewis

This is an action upon the complaint of Benjamin Garland against the defendant, Sims Lewis, for having set a cod trap at a less distance than eighty fathoms from his, the complainant's trap previously set contrary to Rule 48 of the Rules and Regulations respecting the Fisheries of the Colony made under the provisions of the Act 61 Vic. Cap. 3.

The facts are admitted and the Rules and Regulations for 1918 put in by Mr. Squires, K.C., on the evidence of the complainant, are admitted by Mr. Morine, K.C., Counsel for the Defendant.

Rule 48 is a general rule and forbids the setting of a cod trap or any of the fishing grounds in Newfoundland at a less distance than eighty fathoms of a trap previously set.

Rule 53 is a special rule, made for the District of St. John's, which includes the waters from the Northern Head of Petty Harbor to Sugar Loaf. This rule makes it lawful to set a cod trap or a leader at a distance not less than thirty fathoms in a straight line from the back of any codtrap previously set.

The Defendant's trap is set within sixty fathoms in front of the complainant's trap, and in a oblique line.

It was contended by Mr. Morine, K.C., that under Rule 53, a straight line set can be run in any direction. I cannot hold with this interpretation of the rule. In my opinion, a straight line from any point of the back of Plaintiff's trap, means a straight line running out from the back of the Plaintiff's trap, and at right angles with it.

A straight line drawn from the corners, or junctions of the back and sides of the trap would be in line with the back of the trap and not in a straight line from the back. It would be an absurdity to hold that Parliament or the Rule Committee, meant that a straight line could be drawn from the back of the trap, running through the trap and out in front of it.

I therefore hold that the Defendant is guilty of a breach of the Regulations, and I order the immediate removal of his trap, or in default a fine of fifty dollars or thirty days imprisonment.
