Mr. Dikens of Woodstock did a good business here selling five outfit-gifters.

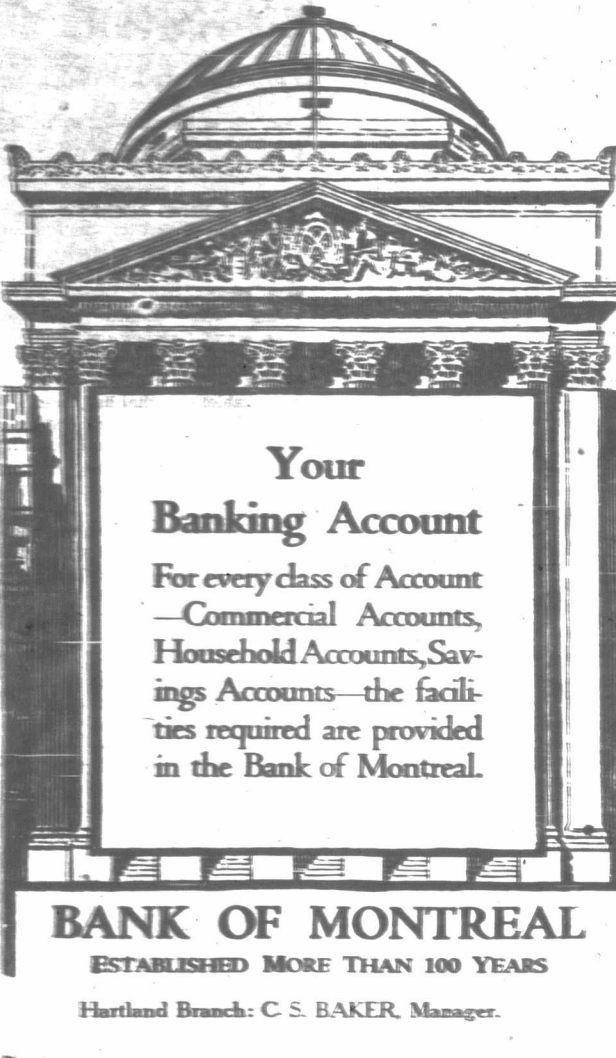
All are glad to note that dawn produce is taking an upward sheet.
