THANKSGIVING CELEBRATION

His Honor Mayor Morrissy was Guest of Honor—List of Gentlemen Present

The American Thanksgiving Dinner at the Miramichi Hotel Thursday night, Nov. 27th in celebration of their National Thanksgiving Day was a noteworthy event, its being the first of its kind in this community. The attendance, appointment, service and order made it remarkably successful, and the innovation will probably become an annual event among citizens of the United States abiding here.

His Honor Mayor Chas. Morrissy representing the people of Newcastle and Canadian institutions was the guest of honor.
