## Clover Harvesting And Seed Growing

Clover seed may be grown in almost any part of Canada, and on almost any kind of soil. Although special machinery may be used in andling clover seed, it is not absolitely necessary.

The soil most suitable for clover seed are: Clay loam and Sandy better results, as it gives a brighter and plumper seed.

Clover should follow a cultivated

crop, such as corn, roots or potatoes or it should be sown on land which has been thoroughly prepared after harvesting the previous crop.

Clovers may be sown with barley, wheat or oats, barley being preferred, however, on account of its being an early ripener and less liable to The growing of clover will not lesson the yield of grain per acre and will be found a great benefit in smothering many weeds.

When seeding clover with barley 1% to 2 bushels of barley should be sown per acre, with wheat 11/2 to 1% bushels per acre and with oats 2 to 21/2 bushels per acre.

With the above quantities of grain should be sown, Common Red Clover at the rate of 8 pounds, Timothy 6 pounds, Orchard Grass 6 pounds

### Harvesting

Harvesting is one of the most particular points in clover seed growing. The first crop of hay must be cut efore July 1, to give second crop of the same year time to mature the seed. As to the time for harvesting the second crop for seed, no special date can be set, as so much depends on the season. As a rule clover should be cut when the majority of the heads are well browned.
